"TIMELY RECIPES"

Delight the children with some home made candy on Christmas Day. This may be prepared before the preparation of the other Christmas goodies begins, and will add greatly to your display of edibles. Furthermore, sugar is a particularly valuable food at this time of year, for it is a concentrated source of that internal warmth which is even more necessary than a sweater or overcoat in protecting active children from the biting cold of the month that are ahead of us. Here are two recipes for unusual holiday-made candies which you will wish to try again and again.

Cream Caramels
 1 cup table syrup
 1 cup cream or rich milk
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 2 cups granulated sugar

Mix together the sugar, the syrup and half the cream, and bring slowly to the boiling point, stirring well. Cook until the mixture will form a soft ball when dropped in cold water. Then add the remaining cream and cook again until the candy forms a hard ball when subjected to the water test. Flavor with the vanilla and pour into a buttered pan. Do not stir the candy more than is necessary during the cooking, as stirring will cause the sugar to granulate.

Holiday Luncheon Dish
 1 box sardines
 1 lemon
 1 bunch radishes
 Parsley or watercress

Remove cover neatly and entirely from a box of sardines. Place on a platter, and surround with wreath of parsley or cress. Cut radishes in the shape of flowers, and arrange in the parsley. Cut lemons in halves, cross-wise, and then cut in deep points. Arrange at ends and sides of platter in the parsley. Serve very cold.

1 package lemon junket
 1 pint milk
 1/4 cup stewed apricots
 4 teaspoons sugar
 2 egg whites

Make junket according to directions on package. Beat the egg whites until stiff; add the apricots, which have been put through a sieve, and mix thoroughly. Pile on top of junket when ready to serve.

Potato Stuffing for Roast Goose
 2 cups hot mashed potatoes
 1 teaspoon grated onion
 1 cup chopped walnut meats
 1 teaspoon grated milk
 Parsley
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/4 cup evaporated milk
 1 tablespoon butter
 Yolks 2 eggs

Mix the ingredients in the order given and handle as any stuffing.

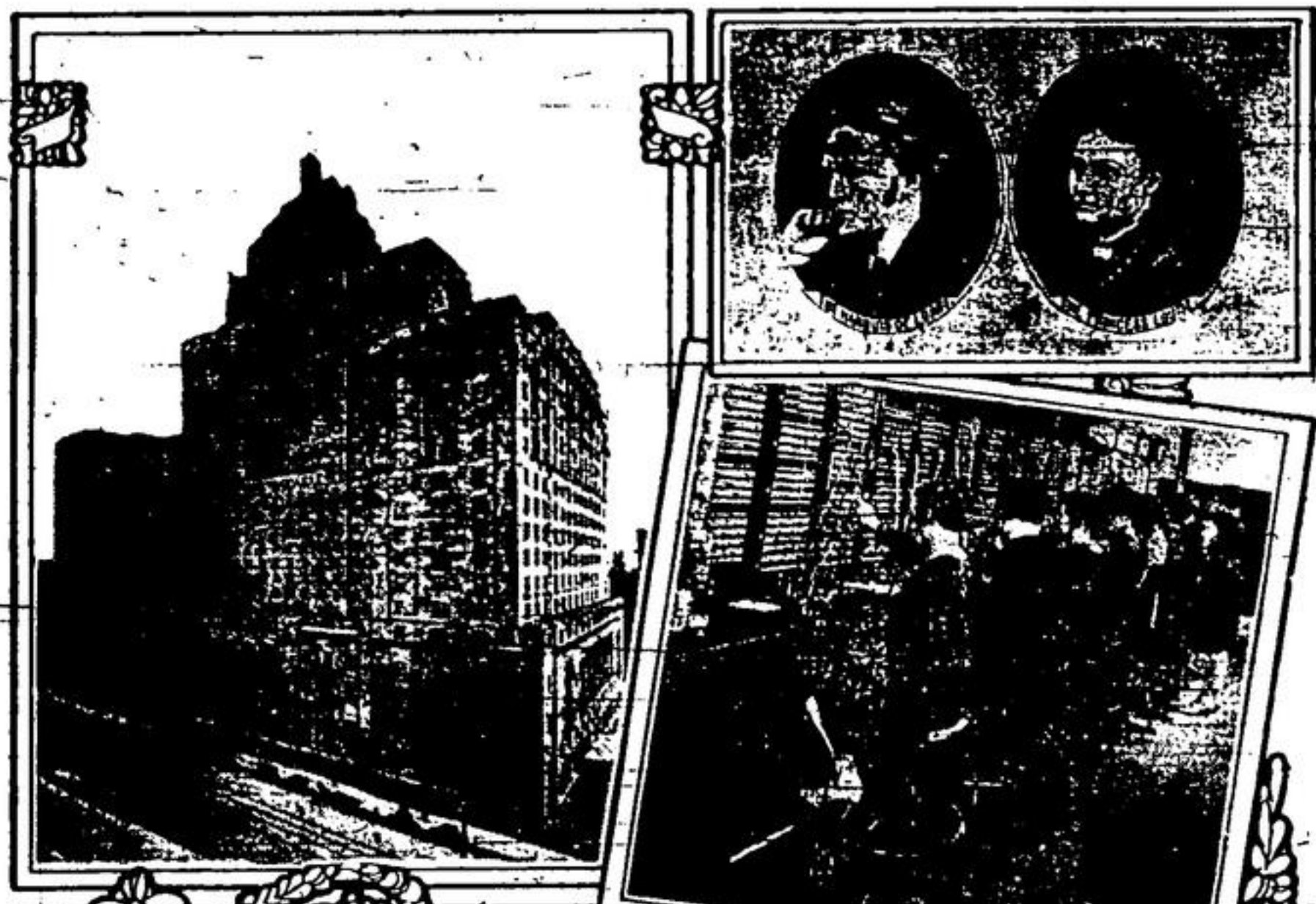

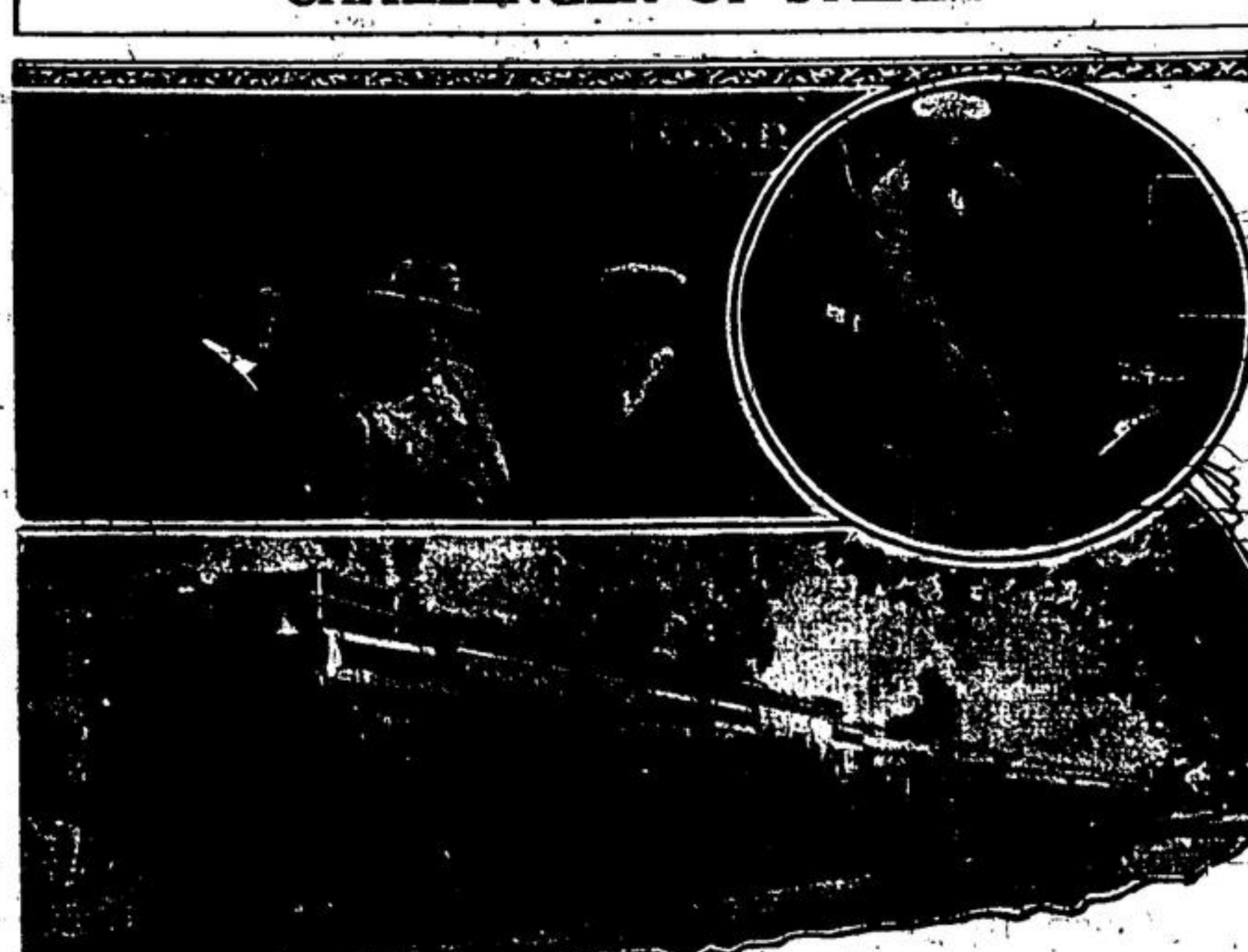

The new motive power unit equipped with 1000 horse power. It consists of two units, each powered with an oil engine important, which, in turn, delivers power to the electric propulsion motors which operate the train.

Canadian National engineers have discovered that with this engine seven times the power is secured from a unit of heat generated by fuel oil as against heat generated in a steam locomotive by use of coal.
