Fire at Milton

Damage is estimated at between \$2,000 and \$4,000, partly covered by insurance.
Deer Killed Near Mayfield
Dogs belonging to Mr. Archie Spets, farmer of the third line east, Chingacous, near Mayfield, worried a two-year-old doe to death on Monday before Mr. Spets could reach the animal. The presence of a deer so far south is unusual. The doe was badly torn by the dogs, but had been a fine specimen. Its presence in the district had been unknown to anybody and from marks in the snow it had made a break for the freedom of the nearby woods before being overtaken on the farm of Mr. Spets. Three years ago, under similar climatic conditions, a handsome fall of snow and cold weather, a deer roamed as far south as the farm of Aaron Laidlaw, first line east, Chingacous.
