News and Information for the Busy Farmer

Raise better from the best cows is the advice of the prominent dairy authority. This advice applies to all classes of stock. Raise breeding stock from the best cows. There will be enough milk even then—without breeding them.

Loans in excess of three millions of dollars were made to farmers of the province during 1929 by the Ontario Government Agricultural Development Board, according to a statement issued by the Provincial Treasurer. The total amount of loans to farmers was about \$19,000,000, and this year will be something under \$22,000,000. This money comes from the deposits of citizens in the provincial savings office.

Canadian Crops

The final crop report for Canada given an interesting summary of the basic industry of the country. The Bureau of Statistics estimates the 1929 wheat yield in the prairie provinces at 225 million bushels as compared with 544 million in 1928. The past average was set at 397 million bushels while the past ten-year average was 349 million. The bureau estimates this year's crop at 143 million bushels or 165 million bushels less than last year. Barley is set at 84 million bushels which is a decrease of 29 million bushels.

KEEP YOUR HANDS FROM YOUR FACE

It is evident to any casual observer that few people have any real appreciation of the fact that their hands should be kept away from their faces. The hands, time and again each day, come into contact with many persons or articles, and, as a result, become repeatedly contaminated with bacteria. If introduced into the body through the nose or mouth, or into the broken skin, may cause some disease or infection.

For many years, it has been taught that hands to be thoroughly washed before their owner eats. This teaching is based upon the dangers of carrying into the mouth, in food or drink, disease germs which are on the hands. A person should no more think of touching his lips or his nose with unwashed hands than he would think of touching food before he had washed.

The unwashed hands should never be used to squeeze or pick some skin abrasion or blackhead. It is true that this is done hundreds of times with no ill results, but, occasionally, as a result of such carelessness, a serious infection, such as facial erysipelas, results. It is best to avoid such infections by an invitation for lurking bacteria to enter. The skin should never be broken—excepting under supervision—with clean hands and boiled instruments. In any case, the pinching or squeezing is almost always unnecessary. Cleanliness of the soap and water variety for the face is the sound practice to keep the skin healthy.

Ten thousand people witnessed the launching of the C.N.S. Prince Henry, new vessel of the Canadian National Steamship, at the yards of Cammell Laird and Co., at Birkenhead, England, when this magnificent new ship was christened by Miss Isabel Macdonald, daughter of Rt. Hon. J. Ramsay MacDonald, Prime Minister of Great Britain. Miss Macdonald, who has travelled over the route between Vancouver and Prince Rupert, over which the Prince Henry will sail after her delivery to Canada, was enthusiastic as to the beauties of this Inside Passage and said she hoped soon to renew the pleasures of that trip. F. A. Pauline, Agent General of British Columbia, congratulated the builders and also the Canadian National Steamships on their enterprise in having this splendid vessel added to their fleet, while C. J. Smith, European Vice-President of the Canadian National System explained the work which the Prince Henry and two other new steamships, soon to be launched, will perform on the Pacific Coast.
