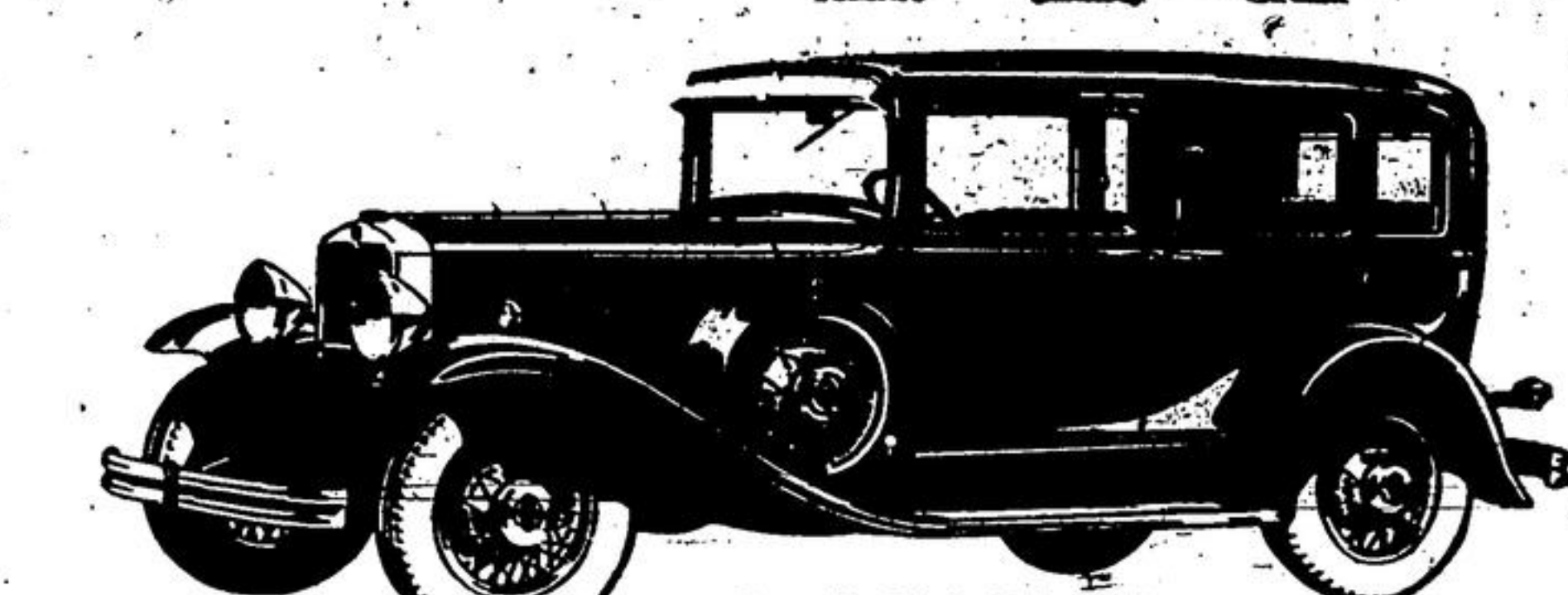

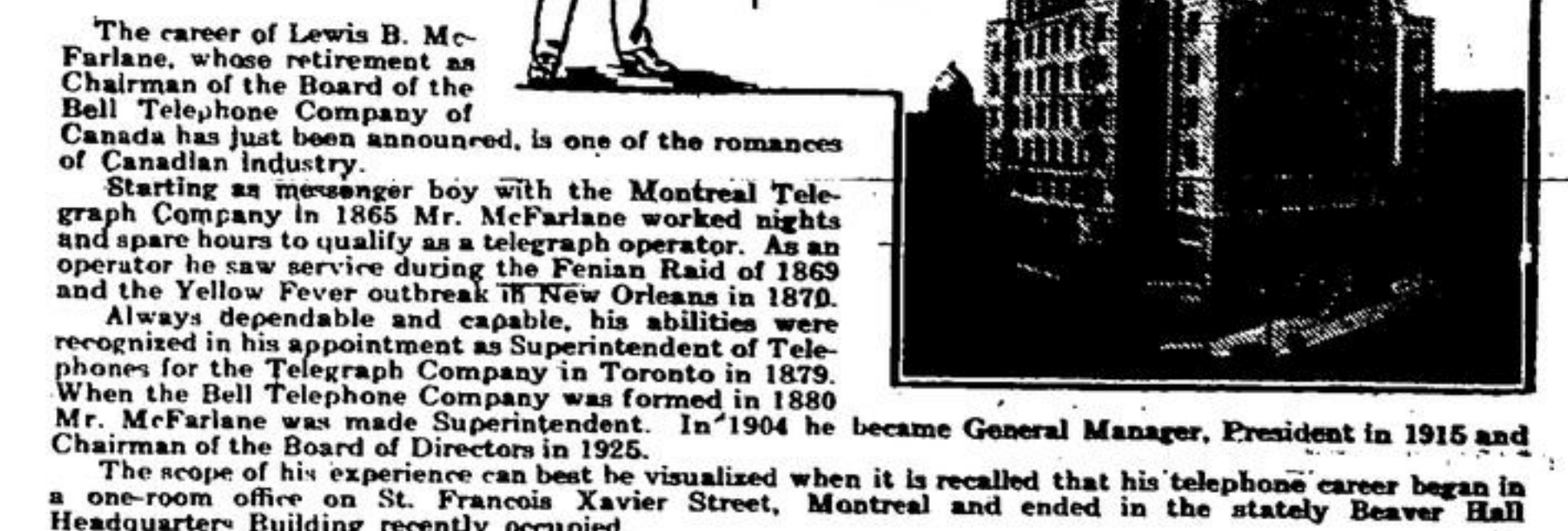

From Message Boy to President



The career of Lewis B. McFarlane, whose retirement as Chairman of the Board of the Bell Telephone Company of Canada has just been announced, is one of the romances of Canadian industry.

Starting as messenger boy with the Montreal Telegraph Company in 1865 Mr. McFarlane worked nights and spare hours to qualify as a telegraph operator.

At the conclusion of the Fenian Raid of 1870 and the Yellow Fever outbreak in New Orleans in 1879, Mr. McFarlane was recognized as a man of great ability.

The scope of his experience can best be visualized when it is recalled that his telephone career began in a one-room office on St. Francis Xavier Street, Montreal and ended in the stately Beaver Hall Headquarters Building recently occupied.
