**GEORGETOWN TAKE FIRST GAME OF SMITH TROPHY CONFERENCE**  
The first game in the Smith Trophy Contest was featured at the Arena here on Friday night, before a fair crowd of enthusiastic spectators. The result was a 3 to 2 score for the home boys. The play was fast and very exciting. The Georgetown forwards, Acton's attacks were completely disorganized by the persistent checking of the Georgetown forwards. They failed to make their checks and were roasting all over the ice taking the puck from one another. Time after time the boys were unable to add to their score if they had passed the puck, but depended on individual strength.  
Georgetown scored their trio of goals in the first period on individual rushes. The first goal was scored by the local boys who were backed up by the whole Acton team, pulling the puck out and banging the disc home. The Acton team were checked to a standstill in this period and the boys couldn't do anything wrong. Ward and Ritchie went through on solo rushes to knock the other two corners. The score being three nothing for Georgetown. After overcoming a lot of hard luck, Huffman, Acton's spangling left winger, got a break and brought to slip the rubber past Wright.  
The second period was one that positively scintillated with speed, hard-checking and splendidly formed and made plays. There were a few penalties in this period for minor offences, but play was fairly clean. Neither team were able to count and this session closed with the same score, 3 to 2.  
Acton started very fast, trying for a score in the final frame, but it was not until a scramble at the local blue line did Anderson notch their second goal. The local boys played defensive hockey in this period, protecting their one goal net. The following many tactics made by the visitors: The game ended with Acton only one goal from trying up.  
Although Georgetown had the edge on the play, the Acton boys were, by means of the puck, able to show they meet in a good game. A shirt team (being our Junior team), turned in a good effort. Ritchie at centre with his checking, and Wright in the net, started all night. Huffman was the visitors' best and Greer, their young intermediate defenseman, was watched closely and not allowed any breaks.  
All together, now, boys. Pack the new Acton arena, to show the boys to victory and bring the Cup home.
