Grading of Cheese Pays  
The grading of food products exported from Canada has had the effect, during the past few years, of greatly increasing the demand for Canadian foodstuffs throughout the British Empire and in foreign countries. A recent case has been cited which shows that 100 Canadian cheese has been selling in England at a price of one or two cents per pound cheaper than that of the best imported cheese. The grading of the product through the system of the apple, penetrating fairly deep into the soil, enables the tree to obtain the lime it requires for the sub-soil. The apple, furthermore, is a plant which prefers a slightly acid soil, and does best under these conditions. However, lime is of indirect value because it enables the farmer to grow leguminous cover crops in the orchards and thereby supply organic matter and nitrogen which are the two constituents absolutely essential for the maximum production of fruit.

It has been found through experiments over a period of the past 25 years that lime has direct value to the apple grower. However, lime is of indirect value because it enables the farmer to grow leguminous cover crops in the orchards and thereby supply organic matter and nitrogen which are the two constituents absolutely essential for the maximum production of fruit.

Ontario Farmers Will Probably Save Many Thousands of Dollars by a Discovery Made by Dr. G. Stevenson  
An important discovery has been made by Dr. G. Stevenson of O.A.C., state of Ohio, of the legislature recently. Dr. Stevenson has found that the use of a certain amount of pig manure makes them unfit for marketing has been caused by worms. This is the first time that an important discovery from the farmer's standpoint. The conditions are general across the province, and Hon. Mr. Martin. "There have been large numbers of sheep and pigs that weren't fit for the market and the farmer was losing money. This condition will be corrected by the use of pig manure. Dr. Stevenson has found that these animals are filled with worms. If one checked this condition will be right through the farm yards and affect the chickens and other poultry and animals. Tests and experiments are being made to cure this condition of worms."

#### News and Information

J. A. Carroll, crops and markets director, explains that to be of the greatest service, a weed inspector or 'adviser' as he is known in the future, should be free to plan and carry out a weed elimination campaign. Some of the lesser weeds will be overlooked this year and the more serious pests concentrated upon.

Jimmy Looks Ahead

Time to Prune  
The time for the pruning of your apple orchard is in the spring before the growth starts, but if this is impossible it may be done immediately after the tree has begun to grow. It is rapidly as possible to prevent decay, which is the most serious danger. Pruning in early winter the wood is likely to dry out and split.

Lime and Manure  
Manure is the fertilizer obtainable, but manure alone will not bring full returns to acid soil. When the soil is found to be acid, a condition which is common in the British Empire, the food from manure that they would if there were lime present to facilitate the absorption of the nitrogen which forms nitrate as these can work only when lime is present. Thus lime ensures the full effect of the manure.

Many Attend Swiss Course  
Western Ontario Junior Farmers were in attendance to the number of 87 at the special educational swine course held at the Toronto Agricultural Institute in February. By means of lectures and demonstrations on live hogs of great excellence, 12 young men were shown clearly why the best type of hog to raise consumers' demand is the most profitable and productive. In the grading competition in conjunction with the course, Leonard Simpson, of R.R. 2, Blenheim, won first prize. George Gordon, of Toronto, won the first prize in the hog competition, while Orville Bauman of Port Huron was first in the dressed carcasses competition.

Inspection Needed  
It is stated by A. Fulton, special inspector representative of the Ontario Fruit Growers' Association, that Ontario apple exporters have great many difficulties to overcome if they are to land apples in the British Empire and in foreign countries. The question of slacks and scalds are paramount in the minds of the British and American shippers in order to be ready for the next shipping season. Shippers in Ontario could be helped by having a thorough inspection at the shipping point not only in accordance with the Fruit Act, but also according to the requirements of the export market.

#### Weekly Crop Report

The most recent weekly crop report at hand concerns chiefly the matter of live stock and the milk situation. In Brand cattle on feed are reported to be fewer than usual. Dufferin reports a great interest in the breeding of heifers in the county with good quality breeding stock. Seed oats of No. 1 grade are selling for \$1.00 per bushel. Cows are in good condition in Dundas County and at a recent sale grade Holsteins averaged around \$100 per head. A plentiful supply of apples is indicated in Durham with lowered prices for eggs. Essex reports a surplus in the milk supply, which is the case also with Frontenac. In Guelph live stock is in poor condition due to scarcity of food and poor pasturing last fall. Purchured live stock is commanding good prices in Haldimand. Fall wheat is looking green and fresh in Huron and a good supply of red clover is indicated in Lambton. A big demand has obtained for certified seed potatoes in Essex.
