**GENERAL NEWS**

One hundred years ago Friday, Van, Archdeacon Strachan, later first bishop of Toronto, dedicated Trinity Anglican church, at Thornhill, which is next Sunday celebrating its centennial when Sir Guy D. Greeney, present bishop of Toronto, will review its century of service.

William Stevens, 63, farmer in Moore township was gored to death yesterday by a mad bull which he was attending in his barn. His body was found by his wife who went in search of him. Fifteen shots from the gun of R. W. Armstrong, Bridgen, were required to kill the animal.

Mrs. Mary Ann Richardson, Dundas highway, appeared before Magistrate McIlveen and was committed for trial on a charge of assaulting Arthur Alderson, who had been arrested by her, when he called at her farm to investigate conditions.

Mrs. Harry Bartonshaw of Oakville was on duty as a head nurse at the hospital on Saturday when she was hurled through the windshield of her Buick automobile in a collision with another car. The driver, Harry Curran, was killed. Mrs. Bartonshaw was hurled to the Hamilton highway.

On request of the business men, due to the increasing number of burglaries, the Acton town council has appointed E. Harpott night watchman to patrol the street. He is to receive a salary of \$750 per year.

Port Credit's new high school was opened to the pupils Monday morning. It cost over \$200,000, presents a very imposing appearance, and is a credit to the contractor and the village.

The silence is significant, the Conservative Leader commented, as the Liberal benches, neither treasury nor private, made any rejoinder.

Continuing, Hon. Mr. Bennett stripped the present bill of the professions of high morality with which the Prime Minister had endowed it, and left it exposed as a straight political measure, addressed to the Toronto Globe and other temperance organs whose support the government was desirous of carrying.

"We are glad," he said on behalf of his group, "that we can support a measure which we, on this side of the house, were prevented by your status from introducing, but for which we have waited for the past four years."

He then traced the history of the liquor bill, which had passed in 1927. He pointed out that the Custom's Enquiry Commission of 1926 had drawn attention to the smuggling of liquor and had specifically recommended that the importation of liquor be abolished. He said that the United States had made a similar recommendation in 1925 in the course of which U.S. Secretary of State Frank Kellogg had urged Canada to adopt a ban upon liquor.

But, Hon. Mr. Bennett emphasized, despite the recommendation of the Commission, the specific request of the United States Government, and the warning of Lord Curzon, the Prime Minister's moral sense had not been outraged to the point of action until a general election had faced him.
