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

Free Material The Ontario Agricultural and Ex-perimental Union is again prepared to distribute in Ontario free material for experiments with grains, potatoes, roots, fodder crops and fertilizers. All seeds and fertilizers will be sent in good seeds and fertilizers will be sent in good time for spring seeding provided applications are received at an early date. The supply, however, is limited and those who apply first will be surest of obtaining the desired material, Prof. W. J. Equirrell of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, is director of experiments.

Shell Forming Material More care should be taken to m more care should be taken to mix properly the meals which compose the mash, as there is no doubt that egg troubles in the way of shell-less eggs, etc., can at times be put down to the mash not being properly mixed. Lack of lime and oyster-shell grit and some grits, make laying difficult in a badly mixed mash a flux of meat or some other source of protein is often found, and that may easily actions. count for shell-less eggs. There is another reason why one should mix the meals properly, and that is that the mash is made more palatable when mixed in a thorough manner
