OBITUARY

JOHN BALLANTINE, SR.
John Ballantine, Sr., died at his home on King Street at two o'clock on Saturday morning, the 29th of March. Mr. Ballantine was born at Roski, near Omagh, Tyrone, Ireland, eighty seven years ago, and emigrated to Canada at the age of eighteen. He settled near Ashgrove, in Esquimaux Township, later moving to Georgetown, where he became engaged in the coal and wood business, which business he conducted till a few years ago, when failing health and strength demanded his retirement. He was also active in the building industry and many houses in Georgetown attest the phase of his life and his honest methods of construction. This business period, which covered forty five years, was marked by an unimpaired record for honesty and sterling integrity, qualities that extended to his home life and life in the community in general. He was one of those rugged pioneers who laboured early and late with axe and scythe, and whose history is the story of the development of the Township of Esquimaux in earlier days he was engaged in the logging business, and his teams were well-known on all the roads that led to Oakville, the shipping point at that time. In religion he was a Methodist, and in earlier days attended the little old church at Ashgrove, which he became identified with. The church in Georgetown, of which he was a staunch supporter. In politics he was a staunch Conservative. In 1889 he was married to Mary Margaret McNabb at Ashgrove, and there and in Georgetown his family of seven were born. Surviving him are his widow, his daughters Mrs. Wm. Rogers of Pointe Claire, Quebec; Mrs. W. A. Main of Georgetown; Mrs. Wm. Edmitson of Disley, Saskatchewan; his sons, James of Hamilton, N.Y., and John of Georgetown. One son, Norman McNabb, died in 1914, and one daughter, Mrs. J. C. Irons in 1924. There are also eight grandchildren and seven great grandchildren. One brother, Mr. Ballantine of London and one sister, Mrs. Wm. Berry of Arthur, survive. His funeral was widely noted, though his passing was unobtrusive, as well to his rugged constitution. When such a man passes there is a deep sense of loss to those who knew him best, but there is also a sense of pride and satisfaction that a life so full of years, was also full of usefulness without a stain of injustice or unfair means.

The funeral services were held at his late residence and were conducted by the Rev. Mr. Caldwell and the Rev. Mr. Rumley. The interment was made in the family plot in Greenwood Cemetery. The pall-bearers were Reeve McIntyre, Mr. Sam Kirk, Mr. Wm. Donald, Mr. Ed. McWhirter, Mr. John Bingham and Mr. J. M. Moore.

R. Scott at home. Deceased was a member of the Presbyterian church, also a member of the W.M.S. of Limehouse. The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Mr. MacLean of Georgetown. GRANT OF \$500 FOR NEW ADDITION TO PUBLIC SCHOOL.

Considerable Correspondence—Accounts Passed

Council met on Tuesday evening with Mayor Mackenzie in the chair, Reeve McIntyre and Councillors Park, Cummings, Davis, Denison, Bessy and Cleave present. Minutes of previous meetings read and confirmed. W. Chief Clerk of the Fire Brigade asked for an increase of \$100 in grant to the Brigade. Mr. Angus Duncan asked Council re error in assessment for income tax. The matter was laid-over for further information. Mr. R. B. Foulis addressed Council re the building of new lavatories and an additional room at the Public School at a cost of \$8500. The present lavatories being unsanitary and a new room necessary for the accommodation of pupils. Plans of proposed new building were presented to Council. Moved by Denison seconded by Davis that the Council to issue debentures for \$8500, for new class room and lavatories be erected.—Carried.

Mr. Angus Duncan asked Council for use of Park on June 3rd for Public School Field Day. The request was granted. Mr. King of Oakville addressed Council re building of pavements in town and repairing Queen Street pavement. Engineer Smith of Oakville addressed Council re building of pavements and cost of repairing Guelph Street.

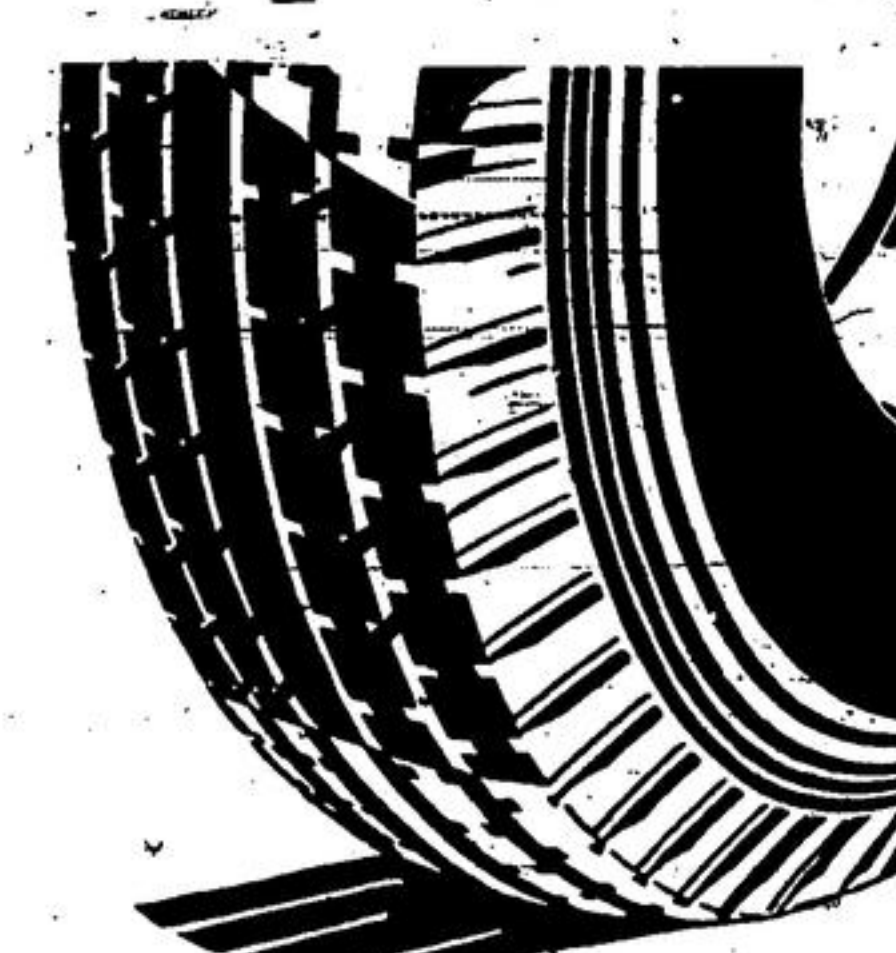
