### Here and There

A resolution of the wide range and high quality of manufactured products centering in the twin cities of Port William and Port Arthur was commented on by visitors to the "Home Industry Exhibition," held at the former city recently. The Exhibit was open only to bona fide manufacturers of the two cities and one hundred entrants had displays in which there was practically no duplication of products.

Forty years ago not a tree could be seen growing on expansive stretches of the virgin prairies in western Canada. To-day trees are plentiful and there is hardly an established farm house but has its shelter belt or a grove of poplars, maples or some other variety of trees. Recent reports of inspectors of Canadian Government Forestry Service show that there are 7,000 farms thus provided and to date over 100 million trees have been distributed over the prairies, with many millions more bought from nurseries and planted on farms.

Alberta led the western provinces in the number of successful farm placements made in 1929 by the Canada Colonization Association when a total of 427 families were settled on 50,803 acres, said W. R. Dick, superintendent of land settlement for the province at a meeting in Calgary recently.

The first of the Canadian Pacific Railway broadcastings took place February 21 over CKAC from Montreal and CKGW from Toronto, and will be repeated every Friday thereafter. These stations were linked over "Canadian Pacific" telegraphs which allow the use of technical improvements brought into use for the first time. Running from 10 to 11 P.M. the nights of broadcasting the concerts will be made up of light symphony orchestral pieces and renderings of light and ballad opera music. The series will be built up to the climax of "Cheerful and Good" and the orchestra will be under the leadership of Rex Battle, a conductor whose brilliant work has won wide popularity. Sea-chanty and French-Canadian and other folk songs will also be featured.

Appointment of L. C. McQuat, one of the Dominion's leading agriculturists, as general agricultural agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway, announced recently, is further evidence of the railway's interest in the development of Canada. Mr. McQuat has had 15 years' experience in agricultural and livestock affairs and enjoys the distinction of having represented Canada on an Imperial committee to study the meat supply of the British Empire.

Shriners making the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, their Mecca next June for their Imperial Council sessions, will find a city ready built and equipped for 8,000 people at their service. The Canadian Pacific Railway is now building "Flag City" composed of railway sleeping cars and marquees to take the place of administration and service buildings. The new city will closely adjoin the Exhibition grounds where the convention is to be held. It will be divided by "The Midway" and its full length will be adorned with a motor road to be known as "Banquet Drive." Streets numbered 1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc., will radiate from "Midway."

### Here and There

Canadian Pacific Railway Friday night broadcasts are now being sent out across the Dominion from coast to coast. Letters are being received from all parts of Canada in appreciation of the programmes and of the radio reception in all centres. Arrangements have been made with the National Broadcasting Company of the United States to place special C. P. R. programmes on the air, early in April, over WJZ to thickly populated sections of the Eastern United States.

Veteran of 65 years railway service and one of Canada's earliest telegraph operators, William Phillip Martin, formerly assistant superintendent of the Canadian Pacific Railway, died in Vancouver recently. He learned telegraphy from his father when a boy and became a chief dispatcher at the age of 18.

Discovery of a new species of whitefish in Clear Lake, Manitoba, is announced by A. Bakov of Manitoba University. The new species has been named Corygonus Odonofus, in honor of Dr. C. H. O'Donoghue, formerly of the faculty of Manitoba University. The newly discovered fish is common in Clear Lake. It lives at a great depth during the summer, coming to the surface only in the spawning season.

Sixty head of pedigree cattle and sheep from the Royal estates in England is the object of Professor W. L. Garfield's trip to the Old Country aboard S.S. Minnesota recently. They are destined for the Prince of Wales ranch at River, Alberta, and are a further proof of His Royal Highness' interest in improving Canadian live stock.

"As far as the army is concerned," the Corps will be a museum piece within the next 20 years," said Brig-General W. H. M. King, recent arrival on S.S. Duchess of York after a trip to Europe, where he inspected regiments of the British Army. General King added that the mechanization of the army was taking rapid strides and, though a costly operation, would pay for itself by decreased maintenance charges within a period of five years.

New Brunswick has an estimated population of 419,000, according to the twelfth annual report of the chief medical officer of the provincial department of health tabled in the Legislature recently. An interesting detail of the report was the statement that during the past year more than 25,000 persons had been permanently immunized against diphtheria.

Surest sign of spring in Eastern Canada is the running of the sap in the maple trees. This annual harvest is now on and last year the total value of maple sugar and maple syrup produced in Canada was \$5,118,556. This money accrues mostly to farmers and the province of Quebec is the leader of the industry in Canada.

Ten years ago capital investment in electric power in Canada was about \$400,000,000. To-day it is over a billion dollars and total power available from present installations is nearly 6,000,000 h.p. This is about one-fifth of possible development.
