On Salisbury Plains and There Abouts

Ingoldby Legends.
When the Ingoldby Legends were
written, Salisbury Plain was much
larger than it is at the present time.
The Plain is still large,
say thirty miles square; but since
those early days the Government
has acquired a large part of it, and
has traversed it with good roads, and
brought the London and Salisbury
and South Western Railway to serve the
needs of the Army, and to provide a
means of getting away from it to
Salisbury and London and to the
amenities of civilization.
The plain is excellent for sheep
grazing but worthless for agriculture,
for the subsoil is a mixture of chalk
and flint which, when wet, has about
the same effect on the roots of plants
with slaked lime of the right mixture
to build into a wall. It was never
turned over except for the men of
Peace, and no plowman would have
the temerity to scratch the bosom of
the West of England, but the
tools of war made deep gashes in the
surface, where the men of the Divi-
sion dug their trenches, and
vainly searched for dark earth or
other material to reduce the visibility
of their positions. The trenches
as conspicuous as the square white
tents that dotted the plain and pro-
claimed the presence of a Military
Camp.

series of hills or downs, as they are
called, and the hills are covered with
some what elevated plain, sparsely
wooded and still more sparsely in-
habited, save for the men of the Divi-
sion.

The area used by the Government
was ten square miles, and on the

Through this Camp area two pluck
little streams flow through the

the streams were in their infancy,
from the subsoil on the Plains. These
streams are the Avon—the Wilshire
Avon, not the Warwick and the
Mediterranean, and these two with
tributaries, form the drainage of
the area.

During that winter of 1914-1915
two Englishmen worked harder than
these little rivers as they endeavoured
to clear away the stones and to im-
prove the drainage of the Camp.
Pivus split up the Plains of Sal-
isbury, as if by way of retaliation
against the Canadian Engineers, and
Millitia for having declared the Camp
at Vaucorther dyke.
