

### THE PASTEURIZATION OF MILK

The Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, has recently distributed copies of an address of the Pasteurization of Milk. It is a particularly satisfactory presentation of an important subject for the reason, reference to some of the statements made are of general public interest.

After pointing out that the provision of a supply of thousands of quarts of milk daily is a task which requires a business organization, it is pointed out that "It is generally conceded that milk and milk products are the most important factors in the food supply of the family."

Concerning the necessity for pasteurization, it is pointed out that to supply a city with a population of 250,000 people requires a daily output of 350,000 average—allowing say five persons to each farm means that 75,000 persons in the farm have something to do with the milk supply of the city. The task of inspecting so many farms and individuals by a system of inspection is impossible. A great deal may be done by education and inspection, but a safe milk supply cannot be assured.

"Pasteurization will not make dirty milk clean; it does make milk safe." In answer to those who object to the heating of milk, it is said that "It must be remembered, however, that though cow's milk is a natural food, people do not get milk directly from the cow." Moreover, it might be noted that the average American food used in the raw state. Like all other animal foods, it is highly perishable, and, like all other animal foods, its food value is lost destroyed by heat.

The only criticism of pasteurization is that vitamin C is weakened or destroyed, but as it is generally agreed that orange juice or tomato juice provide a much more abundant diet, an abundance of vitamin C is thereby provided.

It is brought to the attention of the reader that "canning is one of the weakest links in the chain of effort to insure a safe milk supply." Milk must always be kept "Clean, Cool, Covered." It is clear that pasteurization and controlled pasteurization is the only solution of a safe milk supply.

The provision of pasteurized milk is a step which leads to the glowing health of children and the physical fitness of the future men and women of this glorious country.

No. 7 includes that portion of the Town lying South of Creek and South of No. 7 Highway. (Estimated number of Voters: 200.)

No. 8 includes that portion of the Town lying South of Creek and North of the G.N.E. Main Line. (Estimated number of Voters: 200.)

No. 9 includes Lots 1 to 22 inclusive in Con. 1, 2 and 3 and West Half of Con. 4. (Estimated number of Voters: 200.)

No. 10 includes Lots 8 to 14 inclusive in Con. 9 and West Half of Con. 10; also Lots 1 to 14 inclusive in Con. 11 and East Half of Con. 10. (Estimated number of Voters: 200.)

No. 11 includes Lots 1 to 21 inclusive in East Half of Con. 4 and in Con. 5, 6, 7, and 8. (Estimated number of Voters: 200.)

No. 12 includes Lots 11 to 22 inclusive in Con. 1, 2, 3 and Lots 11 to 21 inclusive in West Half of Con. 4. (Estimated number of Voters: 200.)

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### "Oil Royalties"

Contrary to the general impression, Canadian investments in the United States are greater, per capita, than American investments in Canada. An average statement just issued shows that the average Canadian has \$100 invested in the United States and the average American about \$25 invested in Canada.

Homestead entries taken out through the Dominion Land Office at Edmonton during the month of March last, bring all the land entries in the province up to date.

There were 1,927 homesteads and 19 soldier grants with a total of 277 homesteads and 19 soldier grants which compares with 250 homesteads in March, 1928, the previous record.

The new hotel in course of construction for the Dominion Atlantic Railway at Kemptville, N.S., will be completed this fall and is expected to open shortly before Christmas.

It will replace the present Cornwall Hotel while retaining the name. It will have 100 bedrooms, ballroom and assembly hall, main dining room, rotunda, billiard room, card room and usual offices, and will be a notable addition to the list of modern, up-to-date hotels in the Maritimes.
