Northern Punish The production of salt, whether from mines, lakes, or sea water, is government monopoly, and the duty on it used to be treated as a balancing factor or reserve in the budget In 1888 the salt duty stood at 2% ru-pees per maund, but this was reduced to 2 rupees in 1903, to 11/2 rupees in 1905, and I rupee in 1907. It seems that meanwhile it is standardized at 1 'rupees per maund, or about one

The consumption of salt per head in India, it is stated, varies from 7 lbs. in Raffurian to 16.07 lbs. in Madres In 1907-1908 the gross yield of the salt duty was 3.339,000 pounds of which more than one fourth was derived from imported salt.
