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

Swaziland." Owen O'Neil grew to manhood, received his education at Rhodes, Edinburgh and Harvard universities, and returned to Africa to practice medicine. Each year he visited the Swazis. King Buno had, in the meantime, died, and when O'Neil heard of the approaching coronation of the crown prince he determined to be present. The old queen who had ruled until the crown prince became of age refused to give up the throne, and a civil war was precipitated in which O'Neil played an adventurous part and, with a companion, became one of the only two white men ever initiated into the Swazi tribe.
