The oldest man resident of Berle Township, Wiland County, died last month after a career extending over twenty years. He was "Granny," a Plymouth Rock man owned by Mr. and Mrs. George W. Lawson of Ridgeway. Born in 1910, the Methuselah of Welland had spent the last twelve years of his life in the same place. In her younger years she regularly hatched two broods of chickens per year, and in 1929, her last working year, "Granny" was set on pheasant's eggs to hatch. GENERAL NEWS

Miss Lillian Lee, Forest Ave., Port Credit, collapsed at the corner of Queen and Toronto Sts. in Toronto on Friday while on her way to work, suffering a scalp laceration. She was taken to the St. Michael's Hospital in the police ambulance.

Austin Prentice, aged 19, farmer, son of Sam Prentice, of Lavender district, fifteen miles northeast of Shelburne, is in hospital in a critical condition. After returning from a dance at Collingwood he shot himself in the abdomen and lungs with a rifle, the authorities say.

Brush, Sr., of Milton, finished second in the fourth best of the 30-year race for ranking high school students, and came third in the second heat of the 200-yd. race for junior high school students.

Frank Barton, a patient in the hospital ward of the Toronto jail, held on a charge of murdering his sister, Maurice P. Barton, a treasurer who had committed suicide by butting his head against a wall. He has been removed to the General Hospital where his condition is considered critical.

North York township council yesterday turned from the business of laying out and grading roads to concrete pavements to consider the plight of a widow, mother of six children, who is struggling with loss of her home in the current tax sale.

R. McEwen entertained the members of the Milton Business Men's Association at his home Monday. Maurice P. Barton, a treasurer who has been manager of the Milton branch of the Bank of Toronto for several years, and who has been transferred to Toronto was presented with a club bag.

Judge Denton yesterday sentenced Edward Norman of R.
