News and Information for the Busy Farmer

Interest Developed in Dairying
Two Ontario Counties have recently shown an increased interest in the dairy cow which bids very well indeed for the dairy industry in the province. In Northumberland, the agricultural representative Walter H. Smith, has persuaded Mr. Chambers, the Provincial Dairy Products Inspector at Belleville to open an office to assist his dairy farmers at the beginning of the work twenty-one samples were taken for testing and the new office promises to become a very useful adjunct to the department. In Leeds county the dairymen have arranged to hold a number of meetings of farmers sending milk to various groups of factories with the idea of improving the quality of the milk submitted for these markets.

Changes in Representatives
R. S. Duncan, director of the Representatives Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture has announced several changes in the personnel of his department. Ian McLeod B.S.A. who has been assistant representative in Huron for the past year has been appointed agricultural representative for that county with headquarters at Orlinton to succeed George A. McCague who has resigned. R. C. Barnaby B.S.A. formerly assistant representative of Wellington county has been appointed representative for Dufferin with headquarters at Orangeville to succeed Mr. Campbell Lamont. In Renfrew County Arthur H. Martin will be succeeded by Frank Q. Dench, former assistant representative in Grey County. Mr. Martin has been appointed assistant director of the crops, Co-operation and Markets Branches at the Parliament Bldgs. The following assistant representatives have been appointed—Essex, R. McClellan B.S.A.; Huron, A.M. Barr B.S.A.; Grey, A. V. Langdon, B.S.A.; Wentworth, H. A. Atkinson B.S.A.; Wellington, H. L. Fair, B.S.A.

Grubs and Strawberry Plants
A new strawberry plantation is likely to come to grief if it is on sod land where white grubs make their home. At least two vegetable crops should be taken from the land before strawberry plants are set out. June beetles lay their eggs commonly in grassy land where the grubs which hatch from them require two or more years to develop. In newly ploughed sod, therefore, there will be some half-grown larvae. In the year following, they will be nearly full grown and very voracious and strawberry roots are a favorite food, with the result that an entire plantation may be

Plow in July
"Plow in July while it's dry" is the slogan adopted by the farmers of Wellington County in their combat to eliminate the "Million Dollar Menace" the sow thistle. The method described by Ralph Clemens, agricultural representative, is perhaps the best adapted to the poor drained heavy clay soils on which sow thistle best thrives. A modern two-furrow plow is used, drawn by four horses or a tractor. The hay is gotten off early and the land is plowed while dry to a depth of six or eight inches. The clods thus turned up if left for a few days will dry out so the sun and air will keep perhaps 70 per cent of the sow thistle roots. After a week, if rain has not intervened, a heavy broad-toothed cultivator or heavy disc is used to expose all the roots to the killing effects of heat and drought.

Tests on Alfalfa
Satisfactory yields of alfalfa are fairly common in many parts of Ontario yet many farmers are anxious to find means of increasing the production of this highly valuable, legume and of strengthening the crop. It is well known fact that alfalfa makes use of large quantities of potash but just what quantities of suitable fertilizers will be best to apply to it, is a question in which many practical farmers are interested. In an attempt to answer this important question, a very interesting test is being worked out by the Department of Chemistry, Ontario Agricultural College, in co-operation with R. E. White, Agricultural Representative in Newmarket, on the farm of Earl Twiss, Newmarket.

Grapes and Soy Beans
Elgin Senn, assistant manager of the Border Cities Chamber of Commerce at a recent meeting in Essex County said that it would be well for that county to go in for the cultivation of soy beans and grapes which are in high demand and can be easily be grown there. Recently he had learned that a Border City grower had brought in five hundred tons of grapes from the Niagara District last year. Soy beans are a "dirt crop" and two-fold. The bean carries a valuable oil which is used in the manufacture of paint etc. and the residue after the oil has been extracted makes a better hog feed than the original seed. "Exploitation of the soy bean would have a telling effect on Essex agriculture," Mr. Senn declared emphatically. It is not unlikely that the efforts of Mr. Senn might be applicable to other parts of Ontario.

Inter-County Visiting
Farmer's excursions from Welland, Wellington, Kent, Lambton and Essex are visiting Norfolk County this summer. As a writer in the Farmer's Sun remarks—"If the time and gasoline tank can be spared and the trip is well planned, this inter-county visiting seems to be promising development. There are few of us who cannot learn something by observing what farmers in other parts of the province are doing and how they do it. Norfolk can show most counties something in growing and selling apples; Oxford can give most some pointers in dairy farming; West Middlesex knows how to grow potatoes and other sections have their strong as well as weak points."
