Overseas Export Resumed

After a lapse of two years during which little price levels for cattle in Canada were above an export basis, the cattle trade in Great Britain has been resumed. Recently the Manchester Commercial called from Montreal, Quebec, and New Brunswick, the price of live cattle has risen 125 per cent. to 38.9 per cent. In indications are that fruit will be in fact to good sale, and in general crop prospects are extremely bright. The dry weather which has prevailed throughout most sections of Ontario on various sales will be hastened by a slight reduction in the estimates for plums and prunes, peaches and grapes, although the weather has been considerably larger than last year.
