

OBITUARY
MRS. THOMAS STEELE
One of the pioneers of Georgetown,
Mrs. Thos. Steele, passed away in Win-
dors, Friday, October 3rd. Mrs. Steele
was the eldest daughter of the late
Samuel Creech. When a child of seven
she moved with her father and mother
to Georgetown, travelling by ox-car-
riage, she remembered the building of the
first railway in Georgetown and saw
the first train which went through.
In 1879 she married the late Thomas
Steele, who resided here in 1894. She
moved from Georgetown in 1910.
To make her home with her daughters,
and for the last ten years lived with
Mrs. C. D. Parquharson. For many
years she was a member of Knox
church, Georgetown, and was a life
member of the Women's Missionary
Society. She was a life-long subscri-
ber to the Herald, and was always in-
terested in Georgetown affairs. Sur-
viving her are her daughters, Mrs. C.
D. Parquharson, Windsor; Mrs. R. W.
McKinnon, Regina; Gertrude, Fort
Qu'Appelle, Sask., and Annie, Great
West, New York. The funeral was
conducted by the Rev. Dr. Dickie,
Elora, who was her minister in the
West. Presbyterians of Georgetown,
assisted by the Rev. R. W. Rumley of
Georgetown. The service was held at
her old home, that of Mrs. William
Tyrrell, in the afternoon at 2 o'clock.
The pallbearers were Mr. J. A. Creech,
Mr. J. A. McKinnon, Mr. Alex.
McKinnon, Mr. Harry Matheson,
Mr. John McDermid, Mr. Walter
Evans.
