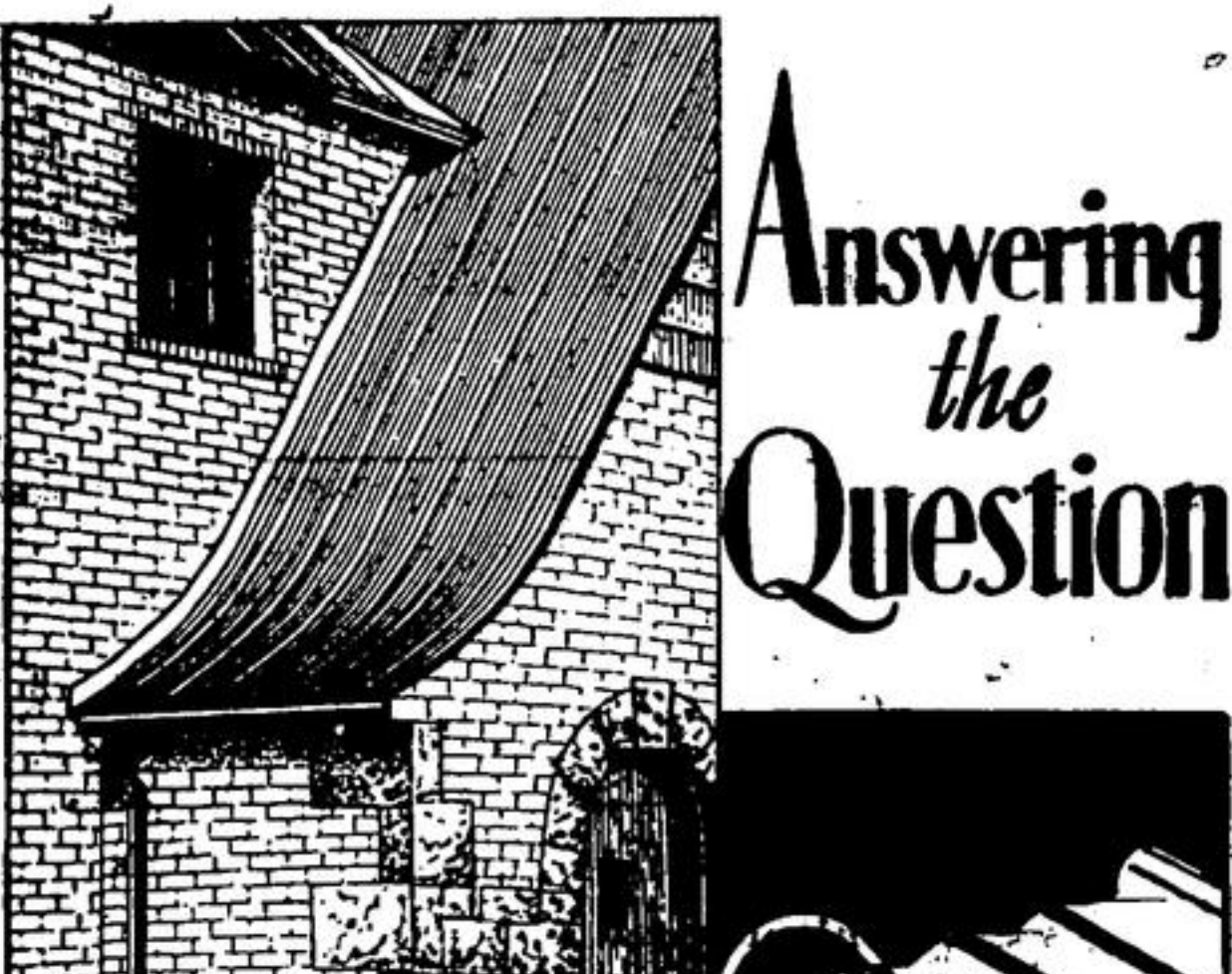

Sun, shine tenderly upon the forehead where his mother laid her kiss.

GRAPE JAM AND JELLY

No matter how much jam and jelly you may have stored for winter use your shelf is not complete without a few jars of the ever-popular grape. The new short-haul method of shipping you to prepare these delicacies in quick order.

Blue Grape Jam
4 cups (2 lbs.) cooked fruit
7 cups (3 lbs.) sugar
1/2 cup pectin

Use only fully-ripened grapes. Separate skins and slimmer pulp, covered, 5 minutes. Remove seeds by sieving. Crush skins through strainer, cover with water, stir until mixture boils, cover and simmer about 30 minutes. Add sugar, stir until mixture boils, cover and simmer fruit into large kettle. Add sugar, mix, and bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard 10 minutes. Remove from fire and stir in pectin. Strain; pour quickly. Cover jars with wax and paraffin; when jam is cold, cover with 1-8 inch of hot paraffin. Roll glass to spread paraffin on sides. Make wax seal. To boys are used, cut, seed and crush them, and add juice of 1 lemon with water in which they are slimmer. Boil about 10 eight-ounce glasses.

Using Candies to Flavor
Many delightful flavors may be secured by making use of candies of various kinds that may be procured almost anywhere today.

Little red cinnamon candies make an excellent addition to stewed apples. Add the candies to a sugar and water syrup, and boil together, then cooked apples to this rose-colored syrup until tender, turning them frequently. When done, the centers may be filled with chopped walnuts and raisins, and a marshmallow placed on top to be melted in the oven before serving.

Bread Frying Dessert
1 package lemon jellies
1 pint milk
4 slices bread
butter
raisins

Remove crusts from bread, butter lightly and cut in small cubes. Divide the cubed bread among dessert dishes and add a few seeded raisins. Warm the milk to lukewarm—do not boil; add the lemon jellies. Stir until dissolved, pour over bread. Let stand in a warm place until firm—then chill. Sprinkle with a mixture of sugar and cinnamon before serving.

NEW TURNIP GRADES

Giving effect to the changes which the first year in operation has indicated, as desirable the Federal Department of Agriculture has by ministerial order under the provisions of the Federal Food and Drug Act, prescribed four new grades for turnips and rutabagas.

It is found in practice that the three grades which were introduced last year—Small, Medium, Large, were inadequate to take care of the requirements of the trade. The new grades are based on size and will be known as "Canada No. 1 small from 3 to 4 inches in diameter," "Canada No. 1 medium from 4 to 5 inches in diameter," "Canada No. 1 large" not less than four inches in diameter.

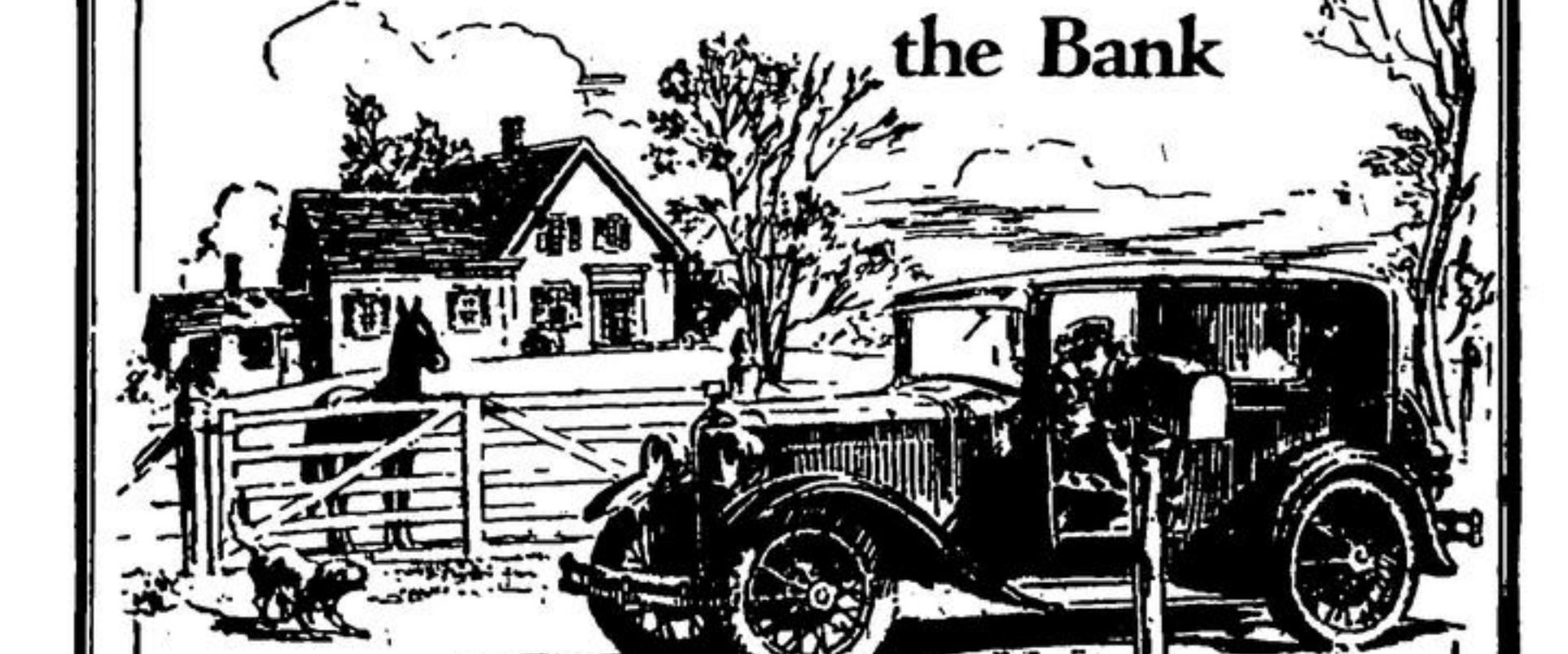
