Proper Ration Needed

A hen may lay a few eggs early in the spring without receiving much feed or attention or she may lay at the end of the season when feed may be scarce. It is the latter condition that will pay without the proper ration during the fall and winter months. When is 'Happy' Easy?

A test of the soil should be made to make sure that it requires lime. If the soil proves to be acid then the answer to the question when is 'happy' is yet to be determined. It is in the rotation, but particularly of benefit to legumes. The best time is possibly just before sowing a crop, and lime is sowed down with alfalfa or clovers. Liming land plowed for fall wheat which is to be seeded with clover in the spring is a convenient and satisfactory practice. Lime is not a fertilizer, but simply neutralizes the acidity of the soil and should be thoroughly worked into the soil during the preparation of a seed bed to become efficient. It is poor business to farm land that is lacking in lime and to grow acid soil in reaction. The productive power of the soil is reduced when it becomes acid. Correcting this condition with the use of limestone increases the efficiency of the manures and fertilizers applied, and therefore contributes to the cutting down of costs of crop production.

Ontario Nuts Win

Kent County has recently been in the limelight as a nut producing county by reason of the victory scored by one of its farmers, Harold English, of the Chatham district, at the Nut Growers' Conference at Cedar Rapids, Iowa. His exhibit of Japanese walnuts was declared the best ever seen by those in attendance at the conference and his fine good cracking, extraction quality, and fine flavor were the points on which the experts based their award. The tree from which these fine nuts came is a beautiful specimen and has made rapid growth. It is only six years old and has borne a good crop. The Chatham man's victory is expected to stimulate the growth of nut trees in Kent County and elsewhere throughout the province. There is no other factor which enhances the value of a farm at so little expense as nut trees.

New School Wine Opened

The new wing of the Vocational Agricultural School at Ridgeway was officially opened on October 20th by Premier George S. Henry and Hon. T. L. Kennedy, Minister of Agriculture. About \$50,000 has been expended on the new building which is equally as commodious as the first building erected in 1926. The new wing includes two large classrooms, a physics laboratory, a room for teaching various agricultural subjects such as field crops, bookkeeping, poultry and a veterinary science, a stock judging ring, four large forges with anvils for blacksmith work, eighteen manual training benches for woodworking, a machinist's bench and a space for motor mechanics. The Ridgeway institution is now the most complete of its kind in Ontario and will be in a position to give a superior type of instruction to the farm boy and girl.

A Tremendous Success

By far the greatest success in its history was achieved at the 1930 International Pleading Match staged last week off Highway No. 7, near the city of Stratford. Two new records were set on the second day of the match, when an estimated total of 40,000 people passed through the gate and the entry list numbered 118,000, passing by 44 the list for a single day in any previous year. The final two days of the match were equally successful and the directors have every reason to feel proud of their achievement. Competitors came from every part of Ontario to take part in the various pleading contests. A departure this year was a competition for women, who made a remarkably fine showing. The site of the match was picture, with hundreds of horses and tractors pulling keen-edged plows through perfect soil to reveal rows upon rows of furrows, straight and true and crowned to perfection.

Canadian Medical Assoc. SINUS TROUBLE

It is not unusual to hear that someone has sinus trouble. Sinus trouble means that there is infection, and as a result, infection in any part of the body is serious. The infection is the result of the activity of living germs, and if allowed to continue, it may result in a chronic poisoning of the body.

The nasal sinuses are the cavities in the bones of the face, which cavities are connected with the nose by narrow openings, and the lining membrane of the nose and the sinuses are continuous.

There is one sinus under the cheekbone, another above the eye, others in the forehead and behind the nose. Some of these sinuses are close to the brain cavity, and infection close to the vital centers is the result of sinusitis such as this.

Sinus trouble occurs when infection spreads from the nasal cavity into the sinuses through the narrow opening into the sinus. Swelling results from the infection, and this swelling blocks the opening and so the infection is sealed in the sinus.

On account of the practical danger of infection from the nose to a sinus, it is evident that grave trouble may be prevented by taking care of the nasal infection—the common cold.

The neglected cold leads to a great deal of trouble and misery. The most serious of these is the sinusitis from which we suffer, and, besides, it is most mischievous in its effects. To neglect a cold is always to invite trouble, and if you are not successful in avoiding the cold, give it early attention.

In the late stages of a cold, if the teeth begin to ache with a feeling of pressure on the back upper teeth, it suggests that the anterior sinus of the cheek-bone is involved. Pain over one eye suggests involvement of the frontal sinus. The pain may be constant; it may occur during part of the day, growing worse and then easing off.

Some of the sinuses may follow colds, influenza, pneumonia, measles, scarlet fever, or indeed, any infection of the upper respiratory tract. In such conditions, which should be brought under treatment at once. Not only is it that the acute stage requires care, but it is of the utmost importance, if possible, a chronic infection of the sinus.

Ontario Benefits By Inspection

Ontario Fruit Growers are repeating substantial benefits from the increased market for peaches and grapes this year made possible through the shipping point inspection service of the Federal Department of Agriculture.

P. H. Steele, District Fruit Inspector for the Prairie Provinces, in a report to the Ontario Fruit Commissioner, states "Ontario Fruit, notably grapes, peaches and peaches, is being hailed as far west as Edmonton." Mr. Steele also reports the quality of the inspected fruit is particularly good.

About ninety per cent of the fruit packed in Ontario this year is moving on the certificate of Federal Fruit Inspectors. The assurance of quality afforded by the Federal Inspection Certificate has established trading confidence in fruit to the material advantage of both producer and consumer.

Norfolk's Tobacco Crop

The greatest part of Norfolk County's nine-million-pound crop of flue-cured tobacco has now been sold at prices ranging from 12 to 15 cents per pound. The average will be about 13 cents. It was estimated that about 13,000 acres were under tobacco in Norfolk this year and while the crop was injured by drought and hail, it occupied the best of the growers will be well rewarded for their season's toil and packing plant at Delhi swings into operation this week.

Current Crop Report

Pull wheat is looking fairly well throughout the whole province, according to reports received, and the farmers in the southwestern peninsula to do late sowing. Marketing Geese

The time to prepare geese for market is when the weather turns cold in the fall. They should then be taken off pasture and those selected for market should be placed in small penned enclosures provided with plenty of water and grit and kept clean.

They should be fed heavily on a mixture of the best medium for fattening of geese, and about two weeks' heavy feeding should fit them for market. Twenty-four hours before killing geese should be starved, but given plenty of water. Gory should be used in plucking, the dry or steam method is being recommended for the reason that the feathers are particularly valuable, bringing as much as 50 cents per pound. The dresser's bill should be rubbed over with a damp cloth and set aside to cool. The twelve-hour box makes a desirable market package.

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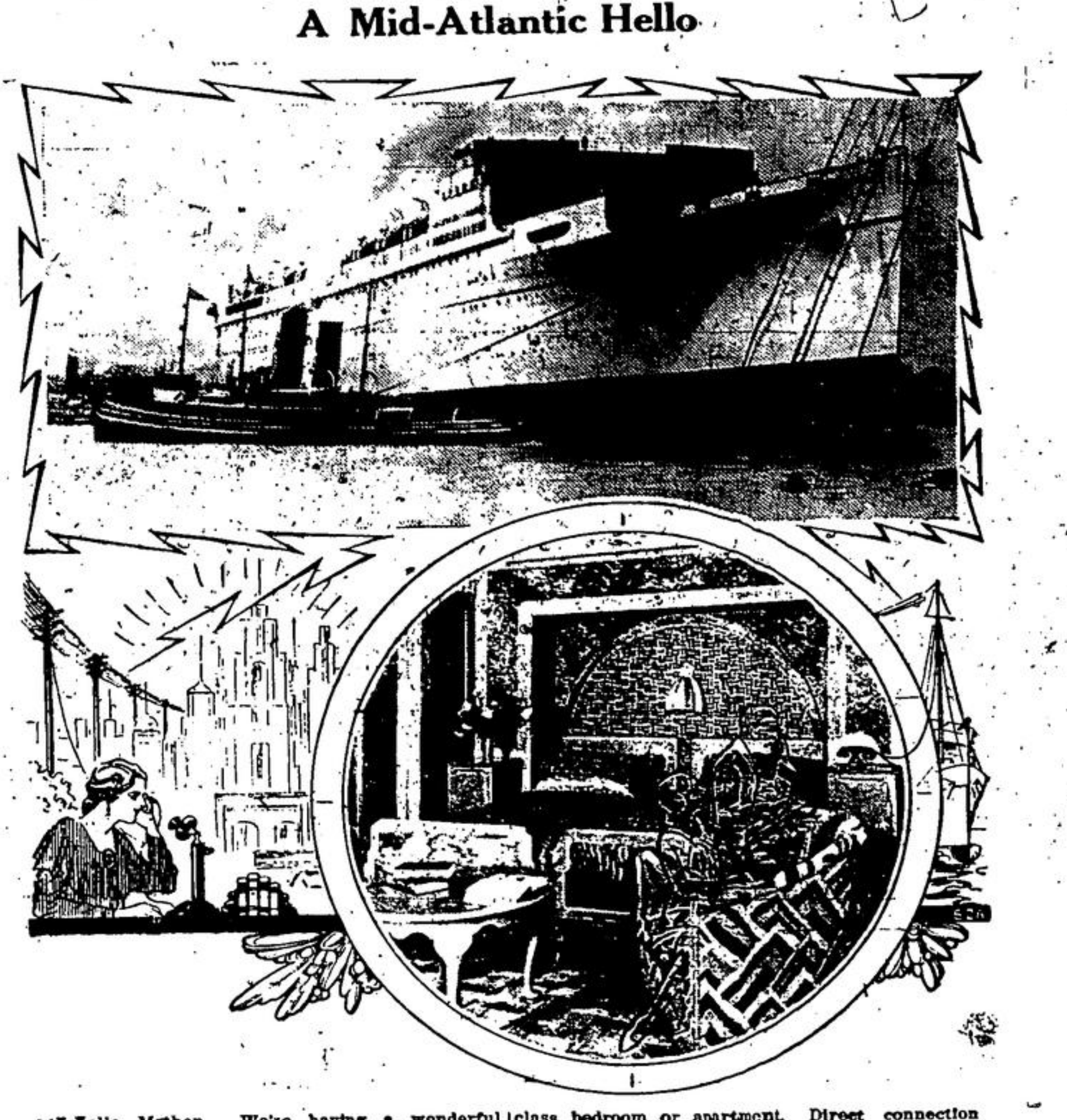
