The Buying Power of a Dollar To-day

I The amount purchasable for a dollar has varied greatly in the past 16 years: In 1914 a dollar was a fair proportion of the cost of a pair of shoes; or a bag of sugar; would buy meat for a few days and was about 75 per cent. of the average man's daily wage.
