MAN WITH SHATTERED SPINE RUSHED 600 MILES BY TRAIN The resources of two railroads and one of the Dominion's largest construction companies were placed to day at the disposal of Syring Ovella, 38-year-old Norwegian, in an effort to save his life.

Early to-day, amid the panting of train engines and the bustle of Toronto Union Station, a gray-blanketed stretcher bearing Ovella was removed from the T. & N.O. special coach "Whitney" after its 600-mile journey from Abitibi.

Ovella, who was working as a laborer on the construction of the dam being built for the Abitibi Canyon power project 75 miles north of Cochrane, was struck in the back and head by a rock-digging machine on December 26. His spine was shattered and his skull almost torn off as a result of the accident.

They have made everything so comfortable for me," said Ovella in an interview with a Star representative aboard the train. Ovella, who holds a B.A. degree from a large Norwegian university, says the lower portion of his body paralyzed on a specially prepared bed. H. P. McLean, president of the Dominion Railway Transportation Company, who arranged for the patient's transportation, had the train engineers cautioned to drive as "easily" as they could.

Ovella, with typical Norwegian reticence, had little to say, beyond a brief description of his accident and a word of thanks to all "who had been so kind to him."

Dr. Edmund Kelly, surgeon on the staff of St. Michael's, will make an examination of the patient today. If necessary, specialists will be brought from New York. H. A. Roover, the company's representative in Toronto, told the Star.

In the third period Anderson tied the score but a well placed shot by Rough tactics seemed the order of the day and many a penalty was given out to both sides.

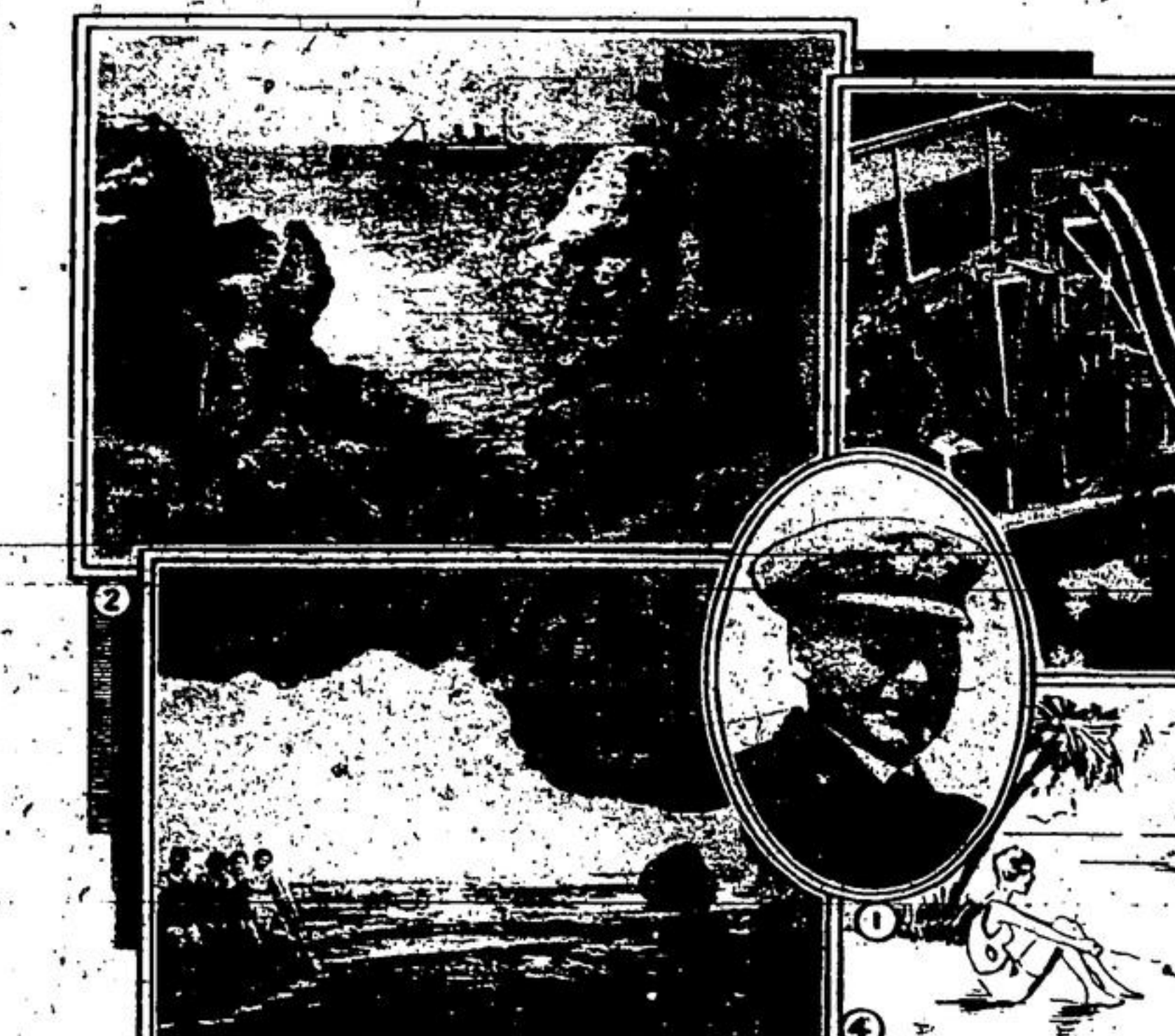
