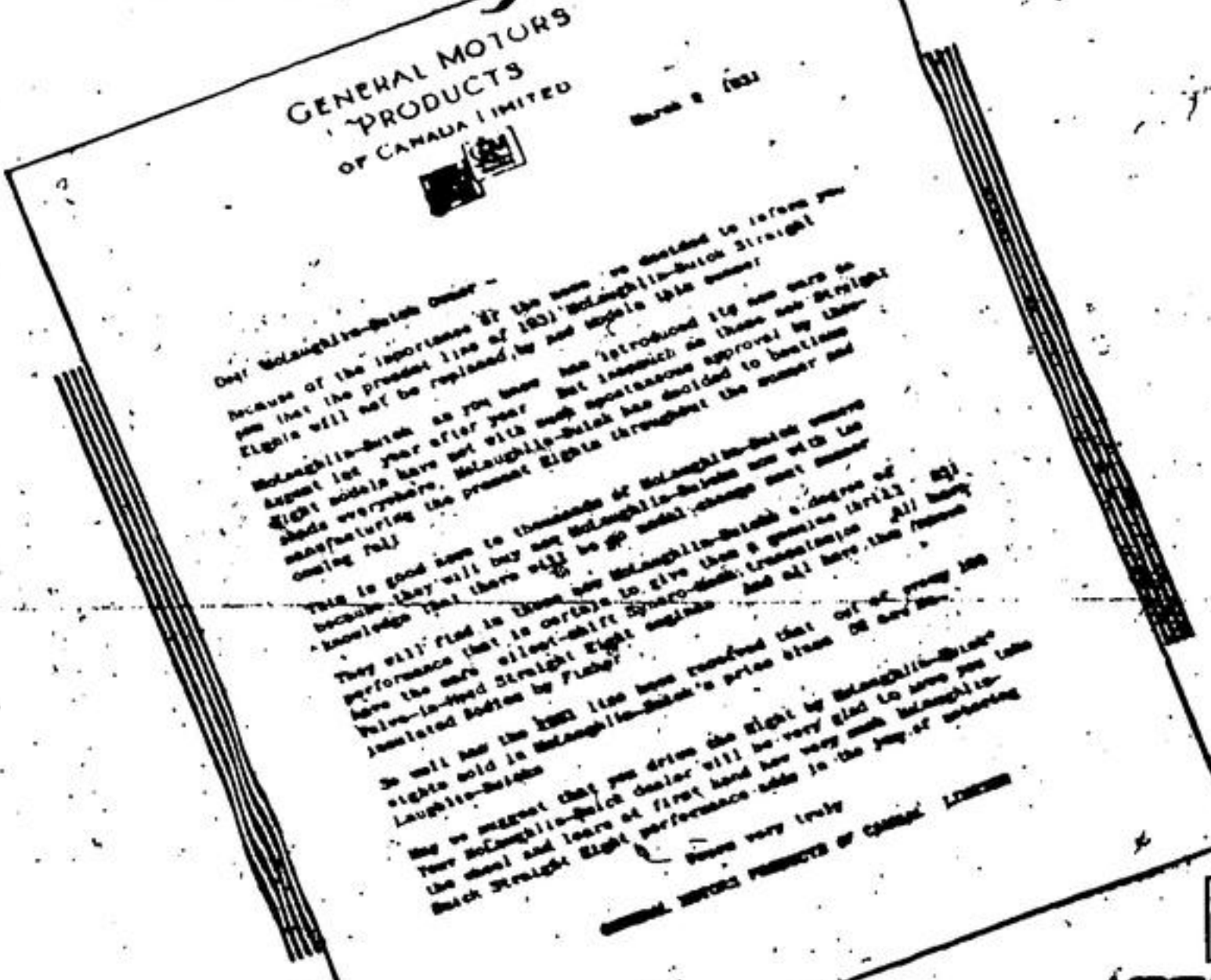

### TOWN COUNCIL

#### AUDITOR PRESENTED ANNUAL REPORT—ACTION TO BE TAKEN REGARDING BACK WATER RATES—ACCOUNTS PASSED

Council met in regular session on Tuesday evening. Mayor Mackenzie in the chair. Reeve Chave and Councilors: Davis, Cummings, Gibbons, Barnes, Parr and Bessey present. Minutes of previous meetings read and confirmed.

Mr. M. Saxe addressed Council re title of tannery property which he purchased from the Corporation some years ago. Council agreed to look into the matter and consult their solicitors regarding same.

Mr. H. Minns town auditor presented the auditors report for 1930. Moved by Parr, seconded by Davis that the auditors report for 1930 be presented to be accepted and that the Council recommend that the Finance Committee, auditor and other Town officials get a written form some plan for the simplifying of keeping of town records.—Carried.

Communications were read from Weston Sanitarium, re indigent patient; from Salvation Army, re tag day in town; from Lawson & Stratton, re school course and spending his money for Sick Children, re payment of account; Ontario Motor League.

The attention of the conference was directed to the fact that the provincial board has discovered a number of cases in which property has been transferred to sons and daughters in order that the parents might receive their old age pension. He cites one case in which application was made by a widow a short time after her husband's death. She owned 100 acres of land and was entitled to all-proceedings to the fact that there are a number of others who are drawing the pension who made their property over to their children or relatives. In the specific case referred to the pension has been cancelled and arrangements have been made to have the money already granted repaid.—Examiner.
