TOWN COUNCIL FOUNDRY PROPERTY SOLD TO GEORGETOWN PORCELAIN CORPORATION LTD.

Smith & Stone Made Offer After

Option Given Above Company At a special meeting of the Town Council on Thursday evening, April 16th, officials of Smith & Stone Limited appeared before the Council and made a written offer of \$4000.00 cash. accompanied by a deposit of \$1000.00 for the foundry on King Street of which property the Town was the owner having foreclosed under it's mortgage.

This meeting was specially called for the purpose, amongst other things, of giving the third and final reading to the by-law authorizing the sale of this propercy to the Georgetown Porcelain Company Limited for \$2500.00. the Town Council had completed fore- PAST MASTERS NIGHT closure of the property and was gofing to sell it was the report that at the previous Council meeting they had given first and second reading to a by-law authorizing the sale of the property to the Georgetown Porcelain Co. Ltd. for \$2500.00.

The officials of Smith & Stone Ltd. contended that the Town Council should have advertised the property for sale and called for tenders so that all interested could tender. They further stated that they were anxious! to have a foundry located in Georgetown as it would be a great benefit to the Town as well as to their Company. If their offer was accepted a foundry would be in operation in a few weeks time with twenty-five employees to start with.

They thought another pottery would not give further employment in the Town as the municipal Council anticipaied. In the first place their pottery which manufactured porcelain, was operating at less than half its capacity and the porspects were that their output would be further reduced if the existing business depression continued. It was pointed out that they had branches from the Atlantic to the Pacific in order to obtain available business and they were satisfled they were getting it. --

They also submitted that if a tile pottery was contemplated the experience of the Frontenac Tile Co. of Kingston, in operation for nearly twenty years with over \$250,000.00 invested, was sufficient evidence that Bro.
