DONALD S. ROBERTSON, MILTON CITIZEN, DIES
In the passing of Donald S. Robertson on Saturday, at Calgary, Milton loses one of its oldest and most prominent citizens. Born on the homestead just outside of the town, Mr. Robertson had been a life long resident of this district, a staunch Liberal and ardent and generous supporter of Knox Presbyterian Church. He was also enthusiastic curler, bowler and golfer, with keen interest in all sports. He will be missed, not only in his community but generally throughout the Dominion, as he was a well known business man, having business interests in many parts of Canada. He is survived by his widow, six sons and two daughters, Stewart, Toronto; Duncan, Drumheller, Alberta; Alexander, Winnipeg; Donald, Patrick, Ernest, Struan, Helen and Catherine, at home; also his brothers, Dr. James Robertson, Chicago, Ill., and Dr. Edwin Robertson of Toronto, as well as two sisters, Miss Isabella and Lillian Robertson, Toronto.

Application for probate of the will of Thomas J. Clark, late of 83 Walmer road, Toronto, and son of the late Thomas Clark of Georgetown, died, was made by National Trust Company, Limited, the executor named therein.
The estate is valued for probate at \$31,375.34, the principal assets being stocks amounting to \$22,473.60 which include a substantial holding of preferred shares of Royal-Clark-Stone Limited, the company with which the late Mr. Clark was associated for many years and life insurance amounting to \$91,886.61.
By the will, the daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Robertson, and the son, Christie T. Clark, receive shares in the Confederation Life Association and insurance. The income from the estate, after which the estate goes to the daughter, the son and their issue.

CHURCH ARMY CRUSADE VISIT
GEORGETOWN SATURDAY, SUNDAY AND MONDAY
A group of young Church Army Crusaders (seven in number) under the leadership of Captain H. Gibson are marching from Toronto to Owen Sound, over 300 miles. They will reach Georgetown on Saturday, followed by service in St. George's Church. For other services see the church notice in this paper. They will leave on Tuesday morning for Orangeville, their next stopping place. The Church Army has been called by the Bishop of London "The Spearhead of the Church." Quite recently H.R.H. The Duchess of York, presented to the founder of the Church Army, the Rev. Prebendary Currier, C.H. D.D., the seventh service star. As each star on a Church Army uniform represents seven years of service, it can be easily seen that he has completed nearly 80 years of continuous service. The Church of England newspaper, just issued a page supplement on the work of the Church Army and the following is an extract from an editorial:
"Founded in 1852 by that wonderful man, Prebendary Wilson Currier, whose heart was aflame with the love of God and his fellow-men, the Church Army has gone from strength to strength. Throughout this period, the beloved Chief whose hand is still on the helm; the vision, undimmed and whose faith is undaunted. Looking at the manifold activities of the Army we see the human in action as our Lord intended it to be—aggressively evangelistic and not forgetting the social implications of the Gospel. As Stanley Baldwin said two or three years ago: "The record of the Church Army is a modern chapter in the Acts of the Apostles."
We are confident that notwithstanding the stirring story that pervades, "The best is yet to be."
