Public School Inspector's Report
The following very creditable report from Inspector Drenyon was read at last meeting of the Public School Board.
Milton, May 22nd, 1931.

The Chairman and Members
Public School Board,
Georgetown, Ontario.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

In making my report to you upon my inspection of your school for the current term, there is no reason why I should write at length. The only change in your staff this term has been occasioned by the resignation of Miss Arthur. Miss Rowan appointed to this room, is applying herself very diligently and proving herself capable of doing with effective teaching, your staff continue to maintain their usual record. They are all careful, progressive and enthusiastic teachers and from the lowest to the highest grade in the school, you continue to be served by a thoroughly efficient staff. The enrollment of the school is at present 338, a slight decrease of three this term.

I note that the attendance figures in this school during this term reveal a record in many cases revealing a 100% of possible attendance. This is very creditable indeed and well reflects the good work done by your Attendance Officer, Mrs. Freure. It also indicates that parents must be deeply interested in the matter of school attendance which surely is very commendable.

In the matter of equipment, I find that the Principal exercises due care in seeing that all necessary provision is made. As to the accommodations, there appears to be no suggestions necessary on my part this year other than that the school building should not be a matter to which the Board are giving their attention.

I ought to make special mention of the splendid work that continues to be done in the subject of music under Miss Harrison's direction. This was abundantly in evidence in the two fine entertainments given by the pupils in March.
