**THE HARVEST**

The harvest usually comes in stages, first fall wheat, then barley, then oats. This year, because of the warm weather, the grains have ripened all at once. Farmers have been obliged to keep the binder going and cut the spring grain before storing the wheat. Another unusual thing is the lack of the uniformity of the harvest. In the Ottawa Valley, which is usually two or three weeks later than south-western Ontario, early variety oats were being cut before July 15. All the harvest is early and practically all the grain has been cut and ready to cut. The farmer who cut his early early was a jump ahead of the more late harvest of the growing season. Rain during the growing season favors the Ontario farmer because of the many late crops, for instance, corn, potatoes, etc. The late crop this year, but conditions have not been so favorable for spring wheat, which will be considerably below the bumper crop of last year.

Animal Misses Pedestrian and Charges into Fence

When the animal stopped looking at Mr. Leslie he picked up a large stone and threw it at the bull between the eyes, stunning it. While the bull was in a dazed condition Mr. Leslie made a dash for the fence some distance away but he had not gone far when the animal, more furious than ever, ran after him.

The bull reached the fence and just as he was about to crash him, but he again used presence of mind and dropped flat on the ground. The bull's mad charge passed him and struck the fence a terrific blow, which, had it not been for the crash, would have killed him to death. Mr. Leslie crawled through an opening of the fence to safety, but is suffering from shock.

**SAY EIGHT SHEEP "TAKEN FOR RIDE"**

Provincial Constable T. H. Owens and Chief Andrew Herks of Brampton police department, arrested Robert Lane, his son-in-law, Willie Goodfellow, and Russell King, all of Owen Sound, yesterday, near Cooksville, on a charge of stealing eight sheep in Owen Sound.

The men had it is alleged, taken the sheep from a farmer, loaded them into a light truck and drove away, which had been removed, and started for Toronto. At Enslinville, four miles north of Brampton, the coach is reported to have been stopped by a constable on an Owen Sound transport, the men loaded the sheep on to the truck and continued through Brampton, police say.

The two constables picked the men up before they reached Cooksville, and brought them to Brampton last night, where they were lodged during the day, being taken back to Owen Sound by night by Provincial Constables Denton and Cook. The driver of the transport was not held as he knew nothing of the alleged theft.

**GENERAL NEWS**

He brandished the gun about and endeavored to scare some of the people who were passing. Mr. McPherson found the young brava and took him into custody. He was not released until he had been taken up for trial before Magistrate McEwen on Monday. He was allowed off on suspended sentence.
