H. Harkness, Toronto, were alerted by the use of grappling irons. Jenkins had gone to the park with a party of Toronto friends and was bathing in shallow water, being unable to swim. His absence was not noted until some time later when the party returned. After an investigation by the police it was but a short time when the body was brought to the surface, but life was extinct. Mr. Jenkins, it is said, suffered a weak heart and it is supposed that he succumbed to shock when he turned toward the dam and it was over two hours before he was recovered again. —Price of Automobile Speed That automobile of greater luxury and power are gaining favor and that price must be paid for speed were brought up recently by Dr. Harrison E. Howe of the American Chemical Society. He pointed out that five years ago the average car went about eighteen miles on a gallon of gasoline; today an eight-cylinder car goes about ten miles on a gallon of gas. The petroleum technologists, he said, had made savings possible by the development of anti-knock compounds and the engines had made them possible by higher compressions, but the increased efficiency was being taken out in power and speed and not by operation economies. This mounting cost of speed, he thought, would eventually have to be reckoned with.

PIPES SKIRL

NEATH SLAM



With the red, white and blue barred standard of Slam fluttering above them in the sunnier sunshine, pipers from all parts of Canada proudly marched and counter-marched in the grounds of the Banff Springs Hotel, Banff, Alta., during the recent Highland Gathering, which was grandly by the presence of T.M. King Prashadipok and Queen Ranahel Barnal of Slam and their suite and a large number of distinguished guests. His excellency opened the festival by raising the flag of St. Andrew, not an interesting character in the person of "Willie" Campbell, of New Westminster, B.C., who was a piper on the personal staff of H. M. Queen Victoria, when King Chulalongkorn of Siam paid an official visit to her, at Guelph, Ontario, in 1894. Piper Campbell gave a special performance for King Prashadipok at the Banff meeting, a new feature of the Gathering was a competition for representatives of pipe bands of the 17 Canadian Scottish militia regiments, which was won by Piper Hector MacDonald of Montreal. Dancing and Highland sports rounded off the afternoon's programme, which presented Scotch light opera in the evening. The picture shows the massed pipers, parading under the Banff flag and (inset) T.
