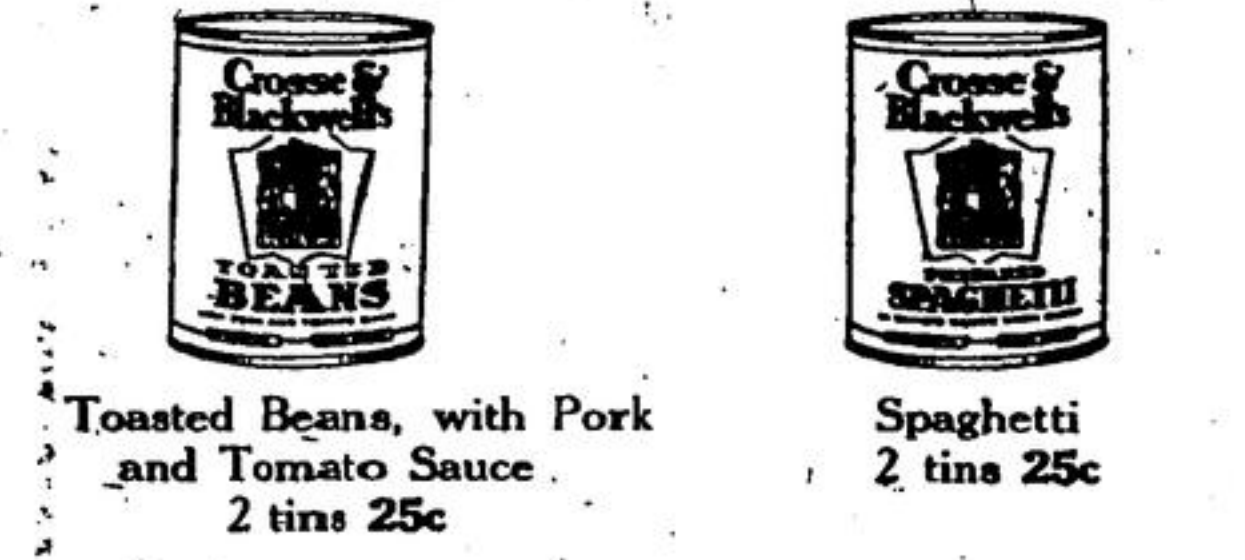

Grain yields ranging from 38 to 70 bushels to the acre are reported in Northern Alberta, according to preliminary results of the Agricultural Department of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

A tree-planting plan on a large scale to extend over a ten-year period has been inaugurated in Saskatchewan by the Government of the whole treeless part of the province and to be started at once.
