OBITUARY
MRS. CHAS. W. STACEY
By the death of Martha Walker, widow of the late Chas. W. Stacey, on Thursday, Dec. 24th, 1932, the County has lost another distinguished citizen. Mrs. Stacey was in her 77th year and had been a resident of Georgetown for the past 40 years. She was born in Swaffham, Norfolk, England, and came to Canada 33 years ago. Her death occurred only a day after she had celebrated her 77th birthday. Surviving are two sons, Leonard, in England, and Clifford, in the United States, and a daughter, Mrs. Stacey, in England. She was a member of the Baptist Church and a strong temperance advocate. The funeral service on Saturday last was conducted by Rev. A. N. Brown, at the Baptist Church when the remains were interred in Greenwood Cemetery.

JOHN SINGLAI
In the death of John Singlai, at the home of his son-in-law, Mr. John H. Lang, Orangeville, on Tuesday, December 27th, in his 87th year, another of the early pioneers of the township crossed the great divide. A son of the late Duncan Singlai, he was born in Erin township, where he spent his life. He was a Presbyterian and possessed high ideals, enjoying a wide circle of friends and neighbors. He is survived by one son, Wm. T. of Georgetown, and three daughters, Mrs. Geo. Thompson, Belknap; Mrs. F. S. McFarlane, Toronto; Mrs. J. H. Lang, Orangeville, and two grand-children, Campbell Singlai and Jean Sivren. Mrs. Singlai predeceased him about fourteen years ago, as did also, one daughter, Mrs. Geo. Blair on April 7th, 1931. The funeral took place on Thursday morning at the residence of his son-in-law at Orangeville, where a short service was held, followed by a public service at Melville Church, followed by a service at Melville Cemetery—Advocate.

MRS. F. S. NEAR
After a period of suffering lasting about three months resulting from a broken leg, sustained from a fall, Mrs. F. S. Near of Georgetown passed away peacefully at Guelph General Hospital on December 23rd, 1932. She was a member of Georgetown United Church, being deeply interested in all the efforts of the church in promoting Christian life and fellowship in all departments of the church, being an active member of the Women's Missionary Society, also a faithful attendant of the church until encumbered by illness, which began about four years ago, gradually increasing until she died. She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Jas. Reid of Perth, Ont., and one son, William of Toronto, also one sister, John Henderson of Galt, Ont. The funeral was held at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Reid, on Monday morning, Dec. 27th. The service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Ramsey, pastor of Georgetown United Church. The remains were interred in Greenwood cemetery. The sympathy of many of the friends and relatives was expressed by the offering of beautiful floral tributes. After a period of illness and suffering borne with great fortitude and courage, Mrs. W. R. Hume, passed peacefully away on Friday, Dec. 18th. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon, Dec. 21st, from her late residence in Nelson; services being conducted by Rev. J. W. Atkins at the home and in St. Paul's Church, Nelson, of which church the late Mrs. Hume was a member.
