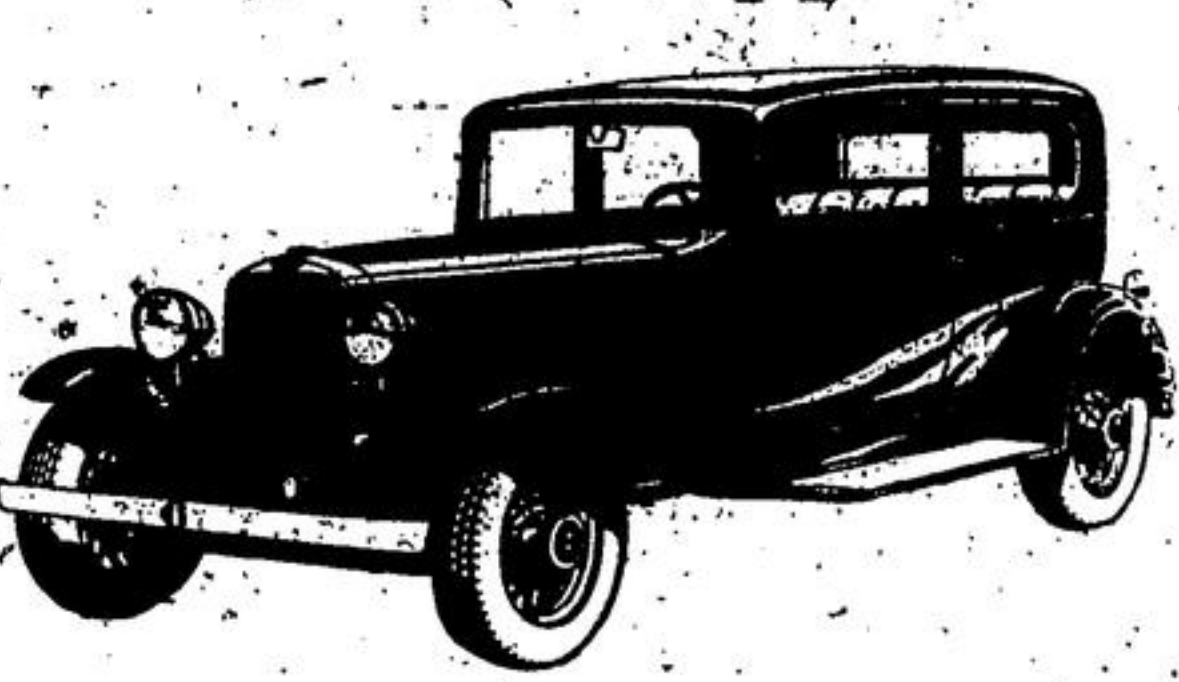

### NATIONAL FAIR ACT AS TOURIST MAGNET

Visitors to Ontario's Outdoor Playground Number 160,000 a Year
