TEXT BOOK ISSUED BY GOVERNMENT A new manual presenting the elementary facts of Canadian government for the use of school teachers of Ontario, in both elementary and secondary schools, has just been issued by Hon. George S. Henry, Minister of Education. It is titled "A Study in Government" and presents its material in a form which is hoped, will go far towards equipping pupils with a sense of what will be their duties and responsibilities as citizens. While textbooks in history that have been authorized from time to time have had additional chapters, these history usually supplement the material of these texts relating to government from other sources. This new manual, it is expected, will prove useful for this purpose. It places emphasis on the features of local and provincial government and on the form of Dominion Government, with considerable space devoted to the British Empire. The Minister has under consideration also the preparation of a text book on the subject of the Dominion Government, which will be issued, may be regarded as a preliminary. One copy of the manual will be sent free to the principal of each school.
