After being in poor health for some months, Major Lechlan Grant, one of Georgetown's oldest, best known, and most highly esteemed citizens, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Arnold Barry, on Monday morning. Deceased was born in Scotland 86 years ago and came with his parents to Canada when about 4 years of age and settled in Streetville, later moving to Glenwilliam. After serving his apprenticeship as a clerk in the mercantile business in Acton, deceased was in business in Georgetown, but retired quite a number of years ago. He was Clerk of the Division Court here for many years and took an active interest in municipal affairs, being Councilor, Reeve, and a member of the Board of Council. He was a member of Otwell Lodge A.P. & A.M. for over sixty years and was Grand Master for 22 years; a member of Grand Lodge and District Secretary of Hamilton District when the late Edward Finley was District Deputy. In 1920 he was appointed Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Canada, in the province of Ontario. He was one of the first members of Georgetown High School Board on which he served for some years. In politics he was a Reformer and in religion a life-long Presbyterian, being a member of the Session for over 50 years. The late Major Grant in recent years contributed a number of historical articles of the early days of Haldon, which were published in the Herald and much enjoyed and appreciated by his many friends and readers generally. A good man who had the best interests of his home town and community at heart, and contributed his share to its betterment, his memory will remain in the hearts of those who knew him best. He is survived by one son, John Grant. The funeral which is in charge of the Masonic Order takes place this afternoon at the family plot in Greenwood Cemetery.

HALTON PRESBYTERY

The meeting of the Halton Presbytery was held on Tuesday, March 15, in Trinity United Church, Burlington. The morning session opened at 10:30 with the chairman, Rev. J. A. Neil, Ph. B. of Toronto, presiding. The devotional services were conducted by Rev. C. H. Wertz, of Carlisle, with the singing of a hymn, prayer and an invocation. Following the reading of the minutes a resolution on peace was presented by Rev. F. W. Huxley, and seconded by Rev. A. MacGowan: "We the members of the Halton Presbytery of the United Church of Canada, do hereby resolve: 1. That we look with the utmost disfavor upon military training in this province, and urge the disbandment of the Caget system. 2. That we are unwilling ever again to be used as a method of settling international disputes. 3. That as a branch of the Christian Church we are giving leadership to the growing conviction that nationalism and militarism are of the past. 4. That we most prayerfully petition the Provincial and Federal governments to urge the cessation of these pronouncements in order that we may show consistency with our avowed outlawry of war, and seek the complete restoration of the minds of our people."

Strathmore Farm Holds Three Milk and Butter Production Records

When milk and butter are the topics of conversation, attention must be directed to the Canadian Pacific Railway's supply farm, at Strathmore, Alta., where three bovine aristocrats have established outstanding production records for 1931, for the whole of Canada. There is little to choose between the three cows; a glance at their pictures tells the story. Excellent stock well handled, has once more proven its worth. The company's Superintendent of Agriculture and Animal Industry, is justly proud of the achievement. Mona Pentecost Walker—14248—under Government supervision—has all the producers in Canada by over 2,000 lbs., having completed a yearly record on November 27, 1931, with 30,464 lbs. of milk and 1,160 lbs. of butter. In 1930, as a four-year-old, she held another record, with 23,802 lbs. of milk and 1,071 lbs. of butter. The next highest milk production record for 1931 goes to Primrose Lily Fleck—151147—who also held the butter record for the Dominion for the same year. Her performance was 22,571 lbs. of milk and 1,210 lbs. of butter. She is an outstanding show animal and took first prize in the dry cow class at Vancouver and Victoria in 1931. The four-year-old production record for Canada, for both milk and butter is held by Strathmore Lady McKinley—14239—scored her record under Government supervision, in 1931, with 25,563 lbs. of milk and 1,023 lbs. of butter. She is a remarkably fine beast of the best of Holstein pedigree, as is shown by her two daughters.
