

In 1930, as a four-year-old, she held another record, with 29,202 lbs. of milk and 1,071 lbs. of butter.

The next highest sells production record for 1931 goes to Primrose Lily Pietje—151147—who also held the butter record for the Dominion for the same year. Her performance was 28,271 lbs. of milk and 1,210 lbs. of butter. She is an outstanding show animal and took first prize in the dry cow to choose between the
