

LEPER MISSION MEETING

Mrs. Fuller then introduced the speaker for the evening, Rev. Mr. Prith, who spoke on "The Leper of high caste and position were afraid to take the treatment as they were in danger of becoming outcasts." He spoke of the leper who is very difficult to find room enough, a great many being turned away, and do not give treatment. Some of these buildings are put up on low lying land, and they are not very high, and are in an awful condition. The leprosy is considered sacred and the leper is considered unclean and is not allowed to live in the dwellings. As there are countless numbers of them they often become nuisances. In Canada, leprosy is at the present time, the last one having died recently. There are 22 leper colonies in Canada. One of these is on the 10th line, where from which the bark was a cure for malaria fever and another tree from which oil is extracted from the nut and this cure for leprosy.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to Mrs. Prith by Mrs. W. Grant, seconded by Mrs. Prith. The offering was taken and after praying the hymn "We thank thee, O God, for the meeting closed with prayer by Rev. Mr. Prith.
