A joint meeting of the Halton County Educational Committee and the Trustees of the County High School Boards, held in the Burlington High School, dealt with the vexed question of the high cost of education County Warden E. M. Readhead pres-Representatives from Georgetown, Milton, Oakville and Burlington attended. The following resolutions were bassed: That salary reductions or increases is a matter between School Boards and members of their staff; that the fees of the presiding examiners were too high. As the teacher or examiner is hired on a yearly salary, it was suggested that the work be divided among them and that all travelling expenses only be allowed, and that the raising of examination fees from \$1 to \$1.50 be disapproved. It was decided to send copies of res-olutions to the Minister of Education for consideration. The Government recently ruled that the maximum fees last year would also be effective this year, namely— Lower School \$5, Mid-dle School \$10, Upper School \$16.

The 1931 census shows 728,244 occupied farms in Canada, or 17,154 more than were shown when the count was taken in 1921. In planting, the hole should be suf ficiently large to take the roots without cramping. Rich loam should be well worked in around the roots. Some of the branches should be removed to offset the loss of roots, and in prunthe distance the lowest branch should

be from the ground. The white elm, sugar maple, red maple, red oak, white ash, and white oak are fine trees for planting in all parts of Southern Ontario. The soft or silver maple should not be planted extensively as it has very brittle wood which breaks badly when exposed to heavy winds and ice storms. The native sumach and dogwood make attractive shrubs for planting

around the grounds. Early spring is the best time to plant trees in Ontario. Chances of success will be lessened greatly if left until late spring, as growth will be quite active and the moving will be a great-
