Georgetown Band is Excellent

The following report of the 25th Concert given on Sunday evening, the Lorne Rifles (Scottish) Band of Georgetown, in the Gregory Theatre was written by Edward W. Wood, music critic of the Toronto Telegram:—
"The last indoor concert of the winter season was given by the Georgetown Citizens' Band in the Gregory Theatre, Georgetown, last evening. An enthusiastic audience filled the theatre, and the programme was more would-be listeners being turned away unable even to find standing room. Bandmaster A. H. Perrotti conducted. One of the happiest features of the evening was the playing of the 'Junior' band, a group of 22 boys from which they senior ensemble—which is also the regimental band of the Lorne Rifles—will draw its personnel in the days to come. These lads are a band complete in itself, every instrument (save perhaps the Sousaphone) in the senior ensemble having its youthful performer. It was an inspiration merely to watch them, seated in such disciplined rows, the youngest—a solo cornetist—18 years of age, and the eldest is in his 20's.
