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PRISON NEARLY READY Penticulary at Kingston to House 10

Erection of the first Canadian penitentiary for women is near completion and will probably be occupied in July. The new institution will provide accommodation for 100 women prisoners. The project was started more than 10 years ago when a prison wall was erected. The enterprise was then abandoned. About seven years ago work was again started on the separate prison for women and was gradually pushed long until now only final de-

tails remain to be completed.

The new buildings will give much needed quarters for the constantly growing number of women comfined to penal institutions, and as the women's prison at Kingston is the only one in Canada its inspetes will be drawn from all parts of the Dominion. At present the women's prison within the penitentiary proper is said to be over-crowded and eccommodation taxed to its utmost, not only in the shops, but also in the sleeping quarters.
