

Unless your reducing diet contains sufficient iron and roughage, nutritional anemia or a clogged system may result. Bran supplies bulk, aids in natural manner in the removal of bodily wastes and is a rich source of the blood-building iron as well as of Vitamin "B". The following recipes, therefore, are particularly important

All-Bran Muffing 1 cup flour 1 cup all-bran 4 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt teblespoon sugar cup milk

2 tablespoons butter Sift all dry ingredients together Add egg well beaten to milk, then add to dry ingredients slowly and mixing well and thoroughly. Add melted fat last. Fill well greased pans two-thirds full. Bake in hot oven, 400 to 425 de-
