Growth of all crops in western Canada is now vigorous and well advanced for the time of year, according to the latest weekly survey made by the Canadian Pacific Railway's agricultural department, and crop prospects in the West as a whole are encour-

Members of the British party touring the Dominion under the auspices of the British Columbian Government, arrived at Montreal aboard the Duchess of Bedford, travelled across Canada by Canadian Pacific rail and lake steamship, stopped over at Banff and will spend between June 15 and July 2 in British Columbia.

Beverages for Special Occasions

On special occasions, special beverages are in order. Each hostess wants to feel that, she is serving something unusual; even though she is willing to admit that it may not be entirely new. Here are three recipies that may be used at bridge parties, weddings, for important guests, or upon any "spec-ial" occasion. Each calls for liberal quantities of sugar-a quick energy food that peps up the body wonderfully on a hot day:

Current Punch Beat 2 cups current jelly to a froth. Add I pint boiling water and % cup sugar. Cook gently until the jelly and sugar are dissolved. Set aside to cool and when cold add the juice of '2 lemons. Dilute with cold water, pour into glasses with crushed ice, and garnish with slices of cucumber peel cut very thin.

> Grape Julce Lemonade 4 lemons 14 pints water

1 pint grape juice .. 1 cup sugar Mix lemon juice with other ingredients. Turn into pitcher half filled with ice, and stir thoroughly. stand ten minutes before serving. -

14 lb. candied ginger 2 quarts water 2 cups sugar 1 cup lemon juice.

Put up fruit juice snow for use next winter-for beverages, gelatin descerts, pudding sauces, or sherberts. Their flavor will be appreciated in the cold weather months, as will also the quickenergy value of the sugar which is used so liberally in preserving them. Try these recipies this year and they wiff be favorites with you always:

Add sufficient cold water to the berries to allow them to float. Simmer them slowly until they lose their shape. Strain off the juice as for yelly. Measure the juice and heat it. each quart add one cup of sugar.-Boil for five minutes, skim. Seal in hot, clean bottles or jars.

Rhuberb Juice Rhubarb juice is particularly valuable for fruit beverages, and for combining with other fruit juices to lend tartness to jellies. It is also good for jellied desserts and pudding sauces. It may be prepared from the stalks that have become too tough to opok in other

Cut the rhubarb in small pieces, add just enough water to cover and simmer until very soft. Strain the juice through a jelly bag. To each quart of juice add two cups of sugar. Heat until the sugar is dissolved. Skim. Bring to the boiling point, Seal in cleap, bot jars or bottles,
