General—All crops in the Prairie Provinces continue to make good progress.

### 24 PERSONS DARTED TO DEATH FROM BEHIND PARKED VEHICLES

J. P. Rickard, Registrar of Motor Vehicles, Ontario Department of Highways, reports for the year 1931, a total of 240 accidents caused by persons stepping from behind parked vehicles or stationary objects.

From this cause, alone, 34 accidents had fatal results and 323 persons were injured.

The automobile, truck and bus are no longer regarded as the "king of the highway" as they have been in the past.

Workmen's Compensation Statement

During the month of June there were reported to the Workmen's Compensation Board 1,614 accidents, as against 1,286 during May, and 4,680 during June of a year ago.

The total benefits awarded amounted to \$444,974.41, of which \$37,854.25 was for compensation and \$407,120.16 was for medical expenses.

The average daily benefits awarded for the half year were \$17,792, and the average number of chques issued, 732.
