The Thirty-first Annual Convention and Tournament of Ontario Provincial Firemen's Association will be held in Georgetown, July 28th and 29th. Monday, August 1st—Monster parade and demonstration—Parade of visiting fire departments, bands and decorated floats will leave the Park at 1:30 p.m. and proceed along Main, Ouelph, Queen and John Streets, returning to Park.

On Monday night there will be a Monster Band Concert in the Park with many and happy dances in the Arenas.

MRS. ALEX. H. HAWES  
Another home was saddened on Monday, July 18th, when Mrs. Alex. H. Hawes, passed away at her home here. Deceased was born in Liverpool, England, and came to Canada when fifteen years of age. She was married to Mr. Hawes in Hamilton, Ontario, and resided there until four years ago when she moved with her husband and family to Georgetown. During her husband's absence she leaves three dear children, sons to mourn the death of a loving wife and mother, Mrs. Arthur Messer, London; Miss Florence, Ouelph; and Richard at home; also three grandchildren, and two sisters, Mrs. Horace Wild, Windsor; Mrs. Albert Klueber, Hamilton. Deceased was a member of the Church of England and the funeral service on Wednesday last was conducted by Rev. W. G. Thompson, son. The pall-bearers were James Chastigan, James MacCartney, Ryan Pagan, S. Walker, C. Sargent and F. Williams. There were many beautiful floral tributes from relatives and friends. The remains were interred in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

### EDITOR FRED DICK OF BRAMPTON DEAD

The death occurred at Brampton last Thursday of one of that town's most prominent citizens in the person of Alexander Fred Dick, publisher of the Banner and Times, the Liberal organ of Peel and one of the oldest members of Ionic Lodge, A.P. & A.M., Brampton.

After an operation last summer he had been able to return to the editorial chair until March when he had to manage the paper from his own home. His father, Alexander Dick, established the Peel Banner in 1828. The appointment of Alexander Dick as registrar for Peel gave him an early opportunity to take charge of the newspaper and for 42 years he has been its publisher.

Mr. Dick married Elizabeth Honeychurch of Ontario and Toronto in 1868 and two sisters, Mrs. W. I. Dick, crown attorney for Elgin, and Miss Christina with Mrs. J. H. Smith, more. Mr. Dick was an adherent of the Presbyterian church. The funeral was held on Saturday at Brampton cemetery.

### NEW CHAPEL OPENED AT NORVAL

Magistrate J. E. Jones opened the new woodshed chapel at the West End Y.M.C.A. camp at Norval last Sunday afternoon, July 24th. The new chapel of the West End Y.M.C.A. and chairman of the religious work, officiated.
