Big Industry Works Full Time
The biggest industry in the Dominion of Canada is working overtime. The "eight hour day"—eight hours in the morning and eight in the afternoon—is in general effect. There will be no let-up in activity in late in the fall. In other words, Canadian farmers are busy harvesting one of the biggest crops in history, utilizing man-power and machinery to their utmost to garner forage and grain and other farm products that are uniformly beautiful. Waiting at the coast in this harvest activity on such a large scale, economists see solid benefits to the Dominion. Times are not wholly bad, regardless of current prices, when Nature is bountiful and harvests are bountiful. Recently motor vehicles played a considerable part in this year's harvest, particularly in the West. Even in old Ontario, trucks were not in the harvest fields and tractors are commonly used to draw grain binders.

Children's dancing contests will feature the 1932 Young Canada's Day programme of the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, August 29th.

TWENTY-MINUTE SERMONS

In our humble opinion the speaker who can present a message in twenty minutes is a man who has mastered the art of public speaking and usually has said something.—St. Mary's Journal-Argus.
