OBITUARY
FREDERICK G. WARNES
Following an illness of some weeks, Frederick G. Warnes, dearly beloved husband of the late Mary Spavin, and an honorable and esteemed citizen of our town, passed away at his home here on Thursday, Oct. 20th. He was in his 71st year. Deceased came to Canada from Norfolk, England in 1816, and has been a resident of Georgetown almost ever since. Mrs. Warnes died in 1893. A family of ten sons and two daughters, Thomas, Eric and Mrs. Harry Woods, Georgetown, Mrs. Cook, Newmarket, Ontario, and the death of a kind and loving father. Mr. Warnes was a member of the United Church and the funeral services were held at St. George's Church on Friday, Oct. 21st, at 11 o'clock, officiated by his pastor, Rev. Mr. Caldwell. The family will receive friends at Joseph Hall, James Wilson, S. B. Cross, James Brunton, Angus Duncan, S. Harrison, and the Rev. Mr. Caldwell. Burial will be in the family plot in Greenwood cemetery.

HALTON PRESBYTERY MEETING
Halton Presbytery, United Church of Canada met in session in Acton United Church, October 25th, 1932. A large number of ministers and laymen were present.

The subject under discussion was "Synagoga." The Rev. Dr. G. P. H. Gordon of Toronto led in the devotional exercises and discussion. Dr. Pidgeon gave a wonderful address on the sources of "Christian Evangelism" and gave able leadership in the discussion of the vital subject.

HALTON DEANERY W.A.
On Tuesday, Oct. 18th, the Halton Deanery Women's Auxiliary meeting was held at Oakville. There was a service of Holy Communion in St. Jude's Church at 10.30 a.m. Rev. W. C. Thompson of Georgetown was the celebrant. Captain Russell Smith was the preacher.

Immediately after the service a session of the W.A. was held in the Parish Hall. Mrs. Dudley Smith of Dundas, the Moosman President, was in the chair. Monday prayers led by Canon Russell Smith, who then welcomed the delegates. Minutes of the 1931 meeting held at Acton were read and confirmed. Also the minutes of the first Halton Deanery meeting were read and the Secretary's financial report for the year.

Mrs. Gilbert of Burlington led in a review of the W.A.'s since its organization. The following leaders were mentioned: Mrs. Maclean, Hamilton, literature of educational; Mrs. Mackenzie, Hamilton, Doves; Mrs. Leather, Hamilton, Jubilee fund; Mrs. Henry, Oakville, the Canadian mission; Mrs. McNelly, Hamilton, Doves; Mrs. McNeil, Burlington, girls' branches; Mrs. Toth, Burlington, Little Helpers. Considerable discussion followed on the papers and much useful information.

During the lunch hour the nomination papers for Deanery secretary were filled out. It was found that the roll was called, each branch represented answering with a report of the past year's work. Mrs. Mackenzie was the special speaker, who reviewed the work of the missionaries in Honan in China. She led with his heavers much food for thought, showing that although much is yet to be done, much has been done in the past.
