In times of depression it has been found that the veterans, on account of the fact that many of them have disabilities and handicaps, suffer even more than others who are out of employment, since many of them require special care and attention which they are unable to provide. This is where the Poppy fund, raised by the distribution of poppies by the local branch of the Legion, steps in and provides relief for the situation. It is likely that the demands for such work will be heavy this winter, and a substantial fund will be required.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

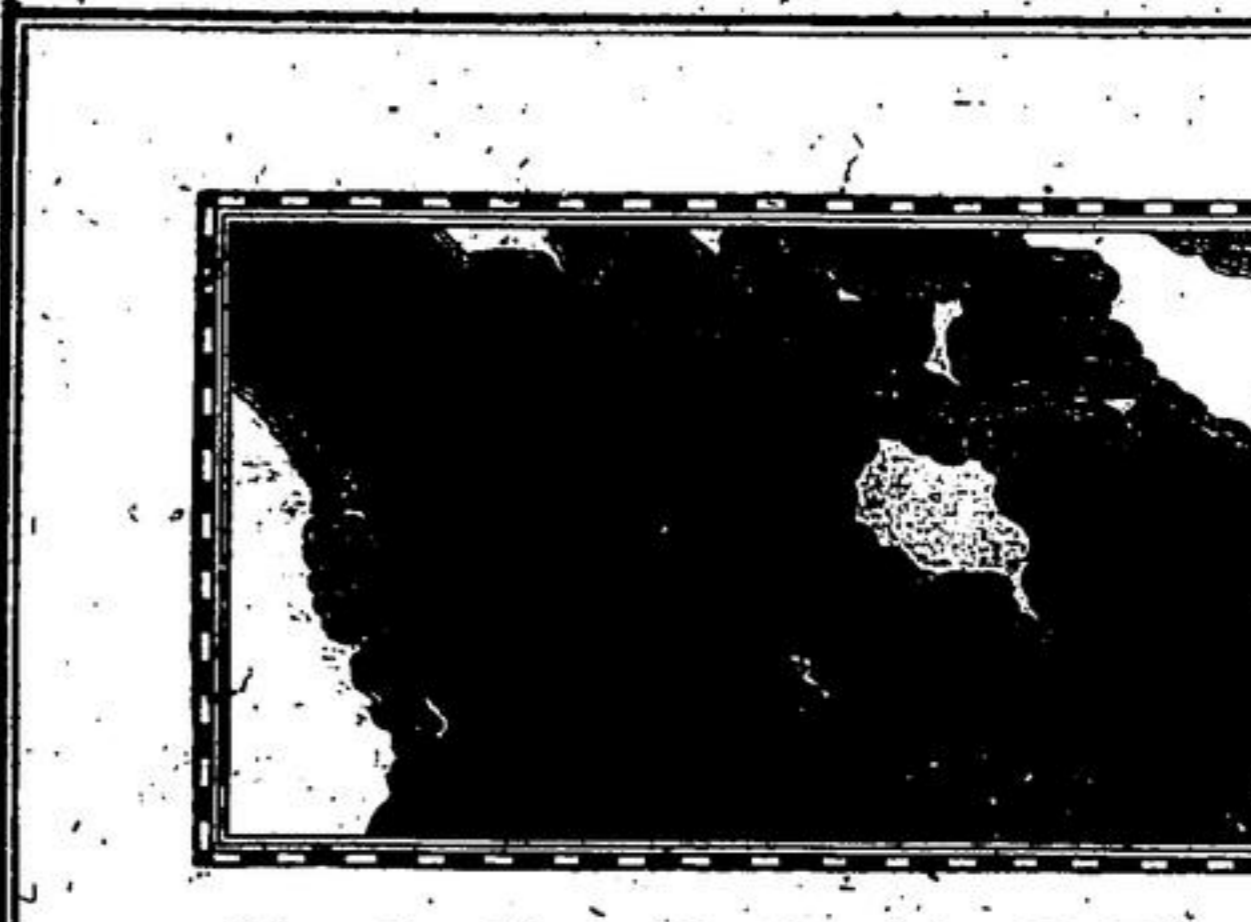
