Friday, November 11th

TWO MINUTES' SILENCE

In accordance with the desire of His Majesty the King, I do hereby request that two minutes silence be observed throughout the Town at the hour of 11 o'clock a.m. on the 11th day of November, 1932, as a mark of perfect stillness to the thoughts of every citizen who is commemorating the reverent remembrance of the glorious dead, and of the victory, by God's grace, vouchsafed to the Empire and to the world.

A Special Commemorative Service will be held in front of our War Memorial at 1.45 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 13th, to give the citizens an opportunity of perpetuating the memory of those who lost their lives in the Great War.

The Service will be in charge of the Canadian Legion British Empire Service League, Georgetown Post.

NOTE—The five strains will be sounded once as a signal for the commencement of the 2 minutes' silence and twice at the end of the period.
