MRS. ELMER C. THOMPSON

The hand of death removed one of our best known and most highly respected citizens last Wednesday, when Kathleen Bradley, beloved wife of Elmer C. Thompson, passed away at her home here after an illness which spanned her entire life in the community. She was a valued member of Georgetown Public School staff for some years and substitute teacher at the time of her death. She was a member of St. George's Church, a life member of the W. A. C. and an earnest, active worker in various organizations of the church, also in connection with the Ontario Mission and Local Council of Women. Deceased was a woman beloved by all who knew her. Her bright cheerful disposition and kindly ways won for her a place in the hearts of her many friends who deeply regret her untimely death and sadly feel the distinct loss to the community. She was married to Mr. Thompson 18 years ago and is survived by her husband and one daughter, Isabel, who will sadly miss the kindly administration of a beloved wife and mother. Three brothers and one sister survive, Dr. Thomas Bradley, Sara, Arthur B. Bradley, Port Union; William F. FRED BEAUMONT

With the passing of Fred Beaumont on the 29th November, an adventurous career was brought to a close at the age of 62. Born in Holmfirth, Yorkshire, England, Fred came to Canada with his parents in September 1870. With strong leaning to the sea it was his early ambition to be a midshipman in the navy, but failing this, he accepted a position with the Richelieu Navigation Co. and for many summers occupied different positions sailing all the Canadian lakes. Although past the age limit he went overseas in 1918 and served in the engineers and close to the war, being invalided home in October of 1918 just before the Armistice. For some time he continued his career as shipper, sailing out of Liverpool to South Africa and other world ports. A few years ago he emigrated with the Canadian Merchant Marine, and up to within a few months of his death had been on the West Indian routes for many years. His winters were spent at his home in the Glen, and during the short period of his married life he lived in Oakville and Glen Williams. He married Margaret Gibb, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm Gibb, Oakville, who preceded him many years, leaving one daughter, Amy, now Mrs. Don Campbell, Oakville. ACCIDENTS AND COMPENSATION

During November there was 3,237 accidents reported to The Workmen's Compensation Board, a decrease of 113 from the number reported during October. The total accidents reported for November is the smallest number in more than a year. The total accidents numbered 18, as compared with 33 in October.

Later awards awarded amounting to \$446,162.63, of which \$39,450.31 was for compensation and \$9, 752.32 for medical aid.

The total number of accidents reported to date this year to 28,510, as compared with 49,009 for the same period last year. However, the benefits awarded amount to \$4,467,326.15, as compared with \$5,877,894.84 for the corresponding period of 1931.

The first plant in Ontario to manufacture malt flour has been opened here for home use in various stores. The flour exported since 1877.
