The following letter has been received by Dr. Watson from a Great War Veteran, former resident of Georgetown who had not been located at time watches were presented to returned men and had not received his unit just recently.

Hesper, Dec. 14, 1932
Dr. Frank Watson, Georgetown, Ontario.

This will acknowledge receipt of watch handed to me by you. This beautiful watch being a token from the people of good old Georgetown to me for my services during the war from your town. To say I prize this watch is certainly putting it mild, it will be apparent to you and those who were instrumental in obtaining same for me, that the sentiments back of the gift is the greater treasure, such I accept it with the greatest pride having been considered worthy of this splendid expression from the Georgetown people.

I was under the impression the watches were for the Georgetown boys alone, as I was working there and my home elsewhere. I could believe that a watch or anything was waiting my claiming it. In making an apology my apparent neglect, I might ask your usual kindly consideration in my case, knowing full well the topsy-turvy state of mind we boys were in, in those early post war days. In my particular case it was indeed a struggle to become settled into my former peace and contentment. Trusting you will accept and extend to the people concerned my thanks for this expression of their sentiments. I am,

FOR CANADIAN BOYS

More than 20,000 Canadian boys have enrolled this year as members of the Fisher Body Craftsmen's Guild and have started in to build miniature model Napoleonic coaches in an effort to win home the \$25,000 in awards which the Guild offers in this year's competition. Many thousands of boys will yet enter the contest. There remains still a month for the young craftsmen to send in their entries to Guild Headquarters in Oakville, Ont.

Six university scholarships worth \$5,000 each, two to be exclusively for Canadian trips to Toronto and the Chicago Century of Progress Exhibition; and more than 140 awards in gold, are offered.

In schools throughout Canada the work of the Fisher Body Craftsmen's Guild has been explained to pupils between the ages of seven to sixteen years. And in many instances, school groups have been organized to study the plans and specifications furnished by the Guild, and to build from them a colorful miniature model coach.
