Teachers Make Relief Donation. Teachers on the staff of the Burlington public schools for the next four months will make a voluntary donation of \$5 per month to the public welfare board to assist the needy in town.

In addition the two principals, G. L. Green and J. A. Leggat, will donate \$10 per month for the same period. This announcement was made at the meeting of the public school board held last night, and the teachers and principals were highly commended by the trustees for their action.

In fact, H. J. Blair, secretary of the board for the last 21 years was so pleased he announced he, too, would make a similar donation along with the staff. The donations from the teachers amount to \$200 per month, but to this must be added the government relief grant which will total about \$100, so that by their action the staff is responsible for many weeks of extra relief purposes. It was further stated that the high school staff is considering a similar action.

New Cars Set Wheels Turning. Symbolic of substantial activity for many months to come in Canada's automotive industry, was the first 1933 McLaughlin-Buick off the line at the Ontario factory of General Motors of Canada Limited a week ago. This "first car" represented production of a car that had been gathering momentum for many weeks, extending its beneficial effects to a score of primary industries. Building of McLaughlin-Buicks will not reach its peak for the season for some months, but in the meantime factories of the same Company at Walkerville and Chatham will be turning out cars at a rapid rate.

Although General Motors of Canada is producing a large number of automobiles in the Dominion there are other Canadian companies whose production program is entering headway at the same time, making a total contribution to Canada's factory activity equivalent to that of other industrial groups, particularly at this season.

OBITUARY

A. G. H. LUXTON. We regret to record this week the death of Monday morning of Councillor Arthur G. H. Luxton after an illness of only two weeks of encephalitis, an affection of the brain.

Mr. Luxton had been in attendance at the Royal Fair at Toronto and had won a number of prizes with his poetry, and took part in the return.

A few days later he went to the Louise Marshall Hospital, where he passed away. The late Mr. Luxton was born and raised in attendance in banking and had risen to be manager of the Bank of Hamilton at Milton for a number of years.

Since his retirement he has lived in Mount Forest and taken a keen interest in municipal affairs. He has been a member of the Town Council most of the time for over twenty years.

In 1919 and 1920 he filled the mayor's chair. For the past two years he has been chairman of the Board of Works. He was an ardent member of the Anglican church, and was warden of St. Paul's church many years. He was also often lay delegate to the synod of Niagara Diocese.

As an avocation he was a well-known breeder and fancier in poultry. His exhibits were usually prizes at the various shows.

His expert knowledge led to his selection to act as judge of poultry at many exhibitions and fairs. To the members of his family the people of the community will extend sympathy in their bereavement; his widow, four children, and a host of friends.

Mr. Luxton was manager of the Bank of Hamilton in Georgetown for many years, and was remembered by many of our subscribers.
