PASS BY-LAW TO BORROW \$10,000 AT SPECIAL MEETING-GRANT TO FIRE BRIGADE REDUCED TO 10 PER CENT. OR \$25.00

ESQUEQUING COUNCIL BY ACCLAMATION

REEVE GEORGE CURRIE, DEPUTY-REEVE, W. G. APPELBE AND COUNCILLORS ROBINSON, MULLIN AND MURRAY

There was a good attendance of ratepayers at Esquequing Township Nomination held in the township hall at Stouffville, Friday last when the following were nominated for the offices of Reeve, Deputy-Reeve and Councilors for the year 1933:

At the close of the nominations Clerk I. A. Thompson presented to the chair and called upon the following nominees who addressed the meeting.

Reeve George Currie was the first speaker and dwelt at considerable length on county affairs. He said that the expenditure on roads could not be met unless the ratepayers demanded it.

The expenditure on High Schools had been heavy and the ratepayers of the Township were given a direct charge on the county, and hundreds attending never intended to go through.

If the first two years' High School work was given a Public Schools thousands of dollars would be saved the county. If not saved in the present school buildings he could not see where there would be any saving.

The Old People's Home had cost the county \$1600 this year owing chiefly to the large amount received from the products of the farm. He explained quite fully the financial situation of the Township and stated that it had been necessary to raise the taxes to meet an over-estimate of the county for the year.

There had not been sufficient money collected for the past four or five years to meet the expenditure. Whoever their pupils the school should not spend more than they collected as the Township was not a business concern.

He said that the County had a deficit of \$400 or \$500. Some had doubted his statement regarding a deficit last year but the auditors had verified his statements. He would be a candidate for the Reeve and his friends would support him.

Deputy-Reeve W. G. Appelbe was pleased to meet the ratepayers again and said that he had done his best for all concerned. The road account had been lowered, and while the County had spent \$100,000 on roads it had gone to meet uncollectible expenditure.

The money the Council actually had spent amounted to a little over \$18,000. The road account in two, took the penalty off the taxes and no interest to pay on the same.

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W. A. Wilson, nominated for Deputy-Reeve stated that he was a candidate for the office. He thanked all who had voted for him and said he would appreciate their support again if there was a run for the Council for 1933.

R. N. Brown, nominated for Councilor, said the statement this year looked worse than last. There was about \$40,000 taken yet unpaid. He thought the Township financial year should end Dec. 31st and an audited statement presented at nomination.

Then the ratepayers would know the position they were in. A man should not accept a seat on the Council unless in a position to give his time to the serious consideration of the affairs of the Township. If a candidate his name would appear on the ballot.

Wm. Gowdy, nominated for Councilor said he was proud of last year's Council. He would not accept a seat on the Council unless in a position to give his time to the serious consideration of the affairs of the Township. If a candidate his name would appear on the ballot.

That, L. Leslie said he would not be a candidate for the Council for 1933. He would not do with them another year. He had spent no money on the road superintendent's office and was not ordered by Council. He agreed with Mr. Gowdy that we must stop spending money on the road superintendent's office.

Mr. Archie McCallum and Mr. Wm. Schenk two other nominees were not present.

Mr. E. Y. Barralough spoke briefly regarding the unsatisfactory condition of the Glen road.

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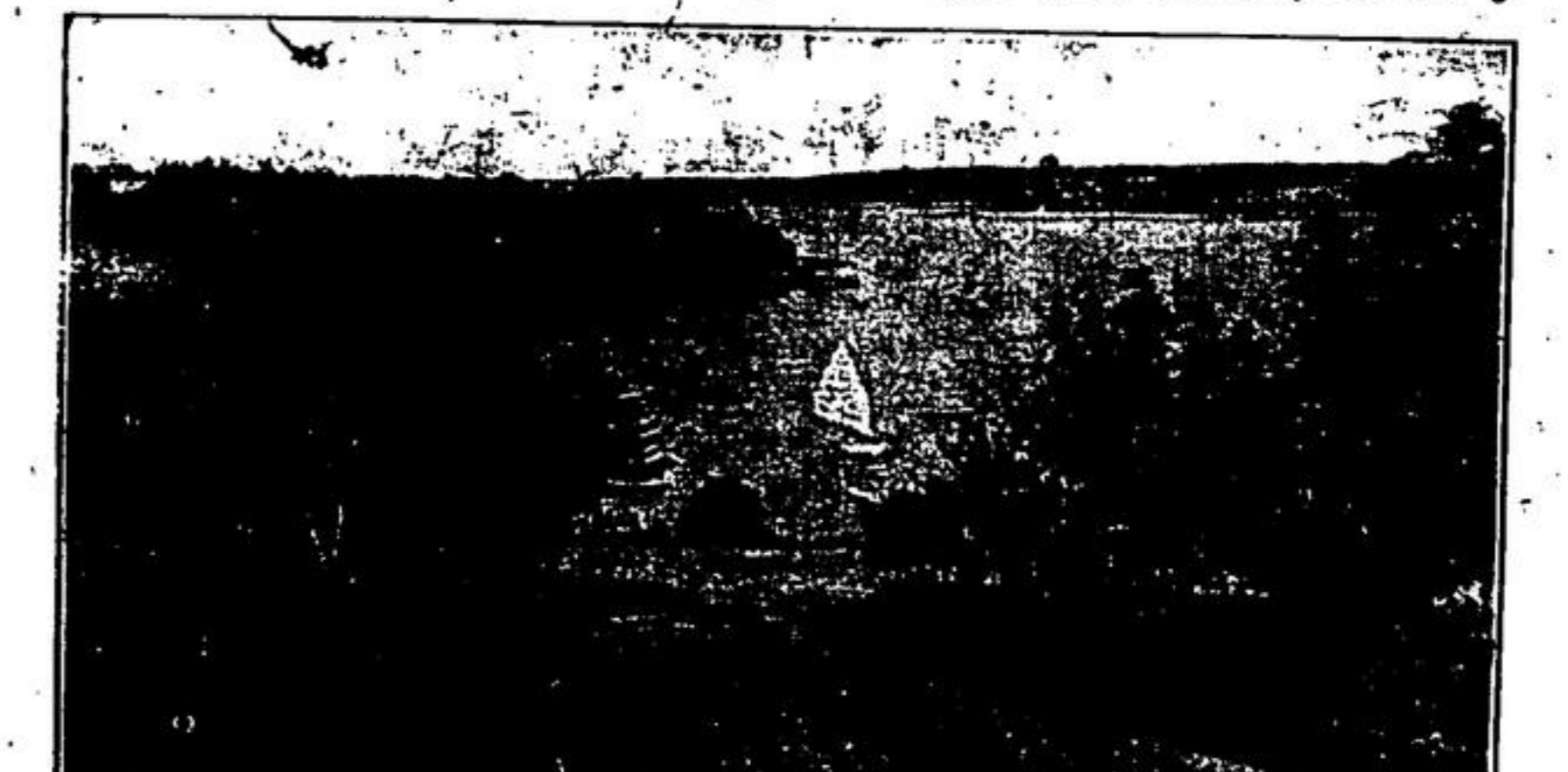
